REPORT OF THE REV. J. J. ROY, B.A., INCUMBENT OF "L'EGLISE DU RÉDEMPTEUR," MONTREAL.

The past year has much that resembles the preceding one, and not to repeat what has been said before, I shall confine myself to a few characteristic points.

In my regular pastoral work there have been cheering incidents that seemed to indicate the presence of the hand of God. The services lately have been better attended; several new faces have been seen in Church, and visited afterwards at their homes; the number of Sunday School scholars exceeds fifty, though the average attendance is much smaller; the day school has thirty-four pupils on the rolls; a watch service, held on New Year's Eve, filled the Church; strangers and Roman Catholics
