Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, excepting 8 and 20, which has not been home-steaded, or reserved to privide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

### ENTRY.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district In which the land to be taken is situate, or if the homestender desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interlor, Ottawa, the Com-missioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is gituate, receive authority for some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10000 is charged for a homestead entry.

### HOMESTEAD DUTIES.

A settler who has been cranted an entry for a homestead is required by the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act and the amendments thereto, to perform the conditions connected therewith, under one of the following plans:thereto, to perform the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act; resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If a settler was entitled to and has obtained entry for a second homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtain ing patient may be satisfied by residence upon the first homestead, the second homestead is in the vicinity of the first homestead. second

(4) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by bim in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. The term "vicinity" used above is menut to findicate the same town, township or an adjoining or cornering township.

A settler who avails himself of the provisions of Clauses (2), (3) of ) must culturate 30 acres of his homestead, or substitute 20 head of lock, with buildings for their accommodation, and have besides 80 cres substantially fenced. (4)

The privilege of a second entry is restricted by law to those settlers only who completed the duths upon their first homestends to entitle them to pattent on or before the 2nd June, 1850.

Every homesteader who fails to comply with the requirements of the omestead law is liable to are his entry cancelled, and the land may e again thrown open for entry. APPLICATION FOR PATENT

should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent, or the Homestead raspector. Before making application for patent, the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands, at Ottawa, of his intention to  $\mathcal{O}^{*}$  so.

#### INFORMATION.

INFORMATION, Newly arrived immigration office in Winnipeg or at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, information as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge, free of expense, advice and assistance in securing land to suit them. Full Information respecting the land, timber, coal and mineral law, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Railway Beit in British Columbia, may be obtained upon applica-tion to the Secretary of the Department of the Interfor, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoba, or to any of the Dominion Land Agents in Manitoba or the North-West Territories.
