Division Secretary 8, reports Burford Grange, No. 138, dead; Charter, books, &c., returned to Division. No. 31

has sent no report for a year; nearly dead.

Division Secretary 11, says business reports from his Grange do not cover one-quarter the business done, but was all that was reported.

Division Secretary 15 says there must be some plan adopted to compel Subordinate Granges to send in their reports in time or we will all get into disor ler.

Division Secretary 23 says—The goods purchased I know to be largely in excess of the amount reported: still there is a great falling off in purchases through the Grange as compared with those of the lattyear or two. The difficulty in many cases in this part of Ontario is the impossibility of obtaining money for dairy and other produce, other than grain, and this has compelled our members to get their requirements from the localdeslers instead of through the Grange. Our Division Grange is beginning to see the necessity of establishing some depot or store, by which the produce of our members might be received and shipped to market without handling, except by the employee of the Grange, and receive in return our family and farm necessaries for distribution. We are beginning also to perceive (although we have been slow in learning), the necessity of more fully combining our purchases so as to realize still more fully the benefits of Co-operation. Division Secreta y 25: I have been waiting for Subordinate Granges to send in their reports, but many are deficient yet.

Division Secretary 31: No trade done through this Division. The different Ganges all report no advance since last Quarter. Division Secretary 43: Those Granges sending reports of business transactions seem to be doing well in buying but it would be well if our members would sell more through the Grange in bulk.

Division Secretary 44: Reports very late, owing to tardiness of Secretaries of Subordinate Granges. Could not some plan be devised to urge Secretaries to be more punctual with their reports?

It will be seen from this report that there are a large number of Granges not reported for September Quarter; the general complaint from Division Secretaries is that Subordinate Grange Secretaries are dilatory in their work.
