HE IS SENTENCED TO BE HANGED ON THE 12th SEPTEMBER.

Toronto, June 26.—In the trial of Thickpenney this afternoon, Dr. Riddell and Dr. Lett were called to give evidence as to the sanity of Thickpenney. Both stated that in the interviews that they had had with the prisoner, he professed a perfect indifference as to his future, and expressed a desire to be hanged.
