May Adopt **Conscription Measures**

London, May 14.—Viscount Haldane, Lord High Chancellor, said in the Lords to-day the Government might yet deem it advisable to resort to some methods of raising troops other than the enrollment of volunteers, while supporting a Bill to give the Government power to control the sale of liquor in districts in which munitions of war are manufactured, which was before the House of Lords.

On second reading Viscount Haldrane said, We are fighting for our lives. He added the opinion has been expressed, until the return of normal conditions the volunteer system would be difficult to depart from, yetwe may find we have to reconsider the situation in the light of the tremendous necessities wherewith the nation is confronted. We are not face to face with that problem yet. At present the hands of the War Office are full with men they possess.

Lord Lansdowne said the House heard with great satisfaction momentous announcement that Government is prepared to reconsider the whole situation in regard to recruiting, in view of the tremendous necessities which confront us. Many Members of the House had thought for a long time, he continued, that an announcement of the kind should be made. They hoped it might be taken as an indication that this very grave problem was engaging the attention of the Government.

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
