When they say a few days ago, when speaking of the necessity of an economic alliance with Austria, that from now on they should commence to furnish the arms for the next war and those to follow. And the German Empire actually is preparing for this. Its children are going to be made ready for mobilization as soon as they are strong enough to shoulder a gun. In this, then, the Germans don't do, treacherously with us. They let us know in advance what we will have to expect if we agree to make peace before having accomplished our material purpose of definitely and completely crushing the military power of Germany, of destroying the Prussian military aristocracy which has produced the Pan-Germanist movement. They know in Berlin that their game has failed this time, and they already for a long time have been thinking of trying to conclude peace on the best conditions that may be obtainable. The time will come, no doubt, when they will be ready to accept, or perhaps to ask for, peace on any terms whatsoever. Who knows but that it may be from their side that some day will come the proposition to declare the war a draw, as King Constantine of Greece expressed it, and that some kind of neutral Power may offer its mediation for the re-establishment of peace on the basis of the status quo ante.

"But, my dear Field Marshal," replied the aged man, "it is all right for me to take care of my health. I am at home, enjoying every comfort and have little else to do but to look after myself. I am, however, wondering how you manage to keep your health and look younger than your sixty-eight years in all the storm and stress of this campaign. I understand you go to bed very late and get up very early, obtaining on an average only a few hours' sleep out of the twenty-four. Yet you appear in better health than ever before."
