Figured in a Gigantic Swindle Eight Years Ago.



Paris, Oct. 18 .--- The disappearance of the notorious Henri Rochette, who was sentenced to three years imprisonment in 1912 in connection with the vast bucket shop swindles, has been cleared up by his arrest at Granville to-day. Under the name of Georges Bienaimee, Rochette enlisted in Paris as a motor cyclist in the first month of the war and was stationed at Amiens.

The Rochette case was one of the most sensational in the history of the French courts. Rochette was ar-rested in 1908 charged with swindling on an enormous scale. His op erations involved a sum of more than \$20,000,000, and at his subsequent trial it was stated that some of the most prominent men in French public life had been either his dupes or his accomplices. A parliamentary inquiry was made into charges that Antoine Monis, for-

on bail, and succeeded in reaching Mexico, where, it was said, he was
