Unnerves Other Prisoners.

BIG DAN GREATLY DEFRESSED.

Prendergast's Face Blanched at the Sound of the Drop.

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—George H. Painter

Chicago, Jan. 27.—George H. Painter was executed here yesterday for the murder of Alice McLean, his mistress. At the first attempt to hang Painter at 7.57 the rope snapped in two and the man was precipitated to the floor, eight feet below. The blood gushed in a stream from his head. He was picked up unconscious and another noose was adjusted and the drop was again sprung of 8.05. This time the execution was successful.

Daniel Coughlin was not himself yesterday. The cause was to be found in the horrible double hanging of Painter. Ten days ago the alleged murderer of Dr. Cronin was removed from the boys' department of the county jail to a cell in 'Murderers' row,' where Painter was confined. From his cell he heard the noise made by the hasty construction of the gallows. The sound of the carpenter's hammer breaking the stillness which pervades the jail at midnight depressed his nerves and he lay awake while unpleasant thoughts of his possible fate drove away sleep. When the hour for the execution arrived 'Big Dan' could not help witnessing through the tars of his cell door the procession to the scaffold. He quickly learned the cause of the noise and confusion and cries which followed, and the news of the ghastly occurrence upset him. On his way to the court room he spoke only of Painter and the hanging to his guards. He expressed great admiration for the gland murderer's nerve. 'It beats everything I ever saw, 'said the prisoner, 'but the rope breaking was an awful thing.'

Painter's death had a remarkably de pressing influence on the other men confined in murderer's row in the county jail. Patrick Eugene Prendergast, condemned to die for the murder of Carter Harrison, to die for the murder of Carter Harrison, took no pains to conceal his grief over the execution of Painter. When he had satisfied himself that Painter-had marched to the scaffold he climbed into the upper bunk and began to pray: "Oh. God, have mercy upon an innocent man," he repeatedly cried, wringing his hands with anguish. "He is being murdered, even as they would murder me."

Prendergast climbed down from his bunk, pu shed his cell mate away from the door and tried to catch a sound from the north corridor. At last it came. The noise of the falling drop reached his cars, Prendergast's face became livid with fear and he looked for a gnoment, as he did the

rrendergasts race became hind with rear and he looked for a moment, as he did the afternoon the jury rendered a verdict of death in his case. Then he buried his face in his hands, mumbled a prayer and climbed back into his bunk.
