Reception To Pres. Wood

Given by the Stake Auxiliary Boards—
A Very Pleasant and Enjoyable Time

There was almost a complete representation of the members of the Stake Boards on Wednesday evening, March 30th, when a very pleasant and enjoyable time was spent in the testimonial given to Pres. Edw. J. Wood.

The object of the gathering was explained by Supt. G. E. Cahoon as being not only an outward evidence of appreciation for our worthy President's endeavors, but also to allow him an opportunity of instructing the Stake officers in a heart to heart talk and that he might feel untrammelled in so doing.

The program consisted of a reading "When you get to know a fellow" (Guest) by Mr. Golden Wolf, duet by Misses Eda Olsen and Rubie Parrish, Original poem "Our President" by Mrs. Talitha Carlson, duet by Misses Ireta Cahoon and Vilate Brown, humorous reading by Mr. S. Williams, and the most original and pleasing feature of the evening, "A Personal Survey of Pres. Wood" by the head of the Stake Survey department, Mr. D. O. Wight. This last was given by presenting to view a colored disk or chart showing how the 9,000 questions asked our President every year were classified: e.g. — 9,000 queries annually (colored green on chart) "When shall I sell my wheat—do you think it is going up in price?" 15,000 questions (colored orange) "Shall we get a crop this year? Weather

going to be favorable? What about the Hoppers?" 9,000 queries annually, "How can I keep my boy or girl going right? Can't you help me—I am losing control?" (this part of chart colored blue). 7,000 requests annually (colored dark brown) "Can't you release me?" and so on.

The presentation speech was made by Mrs. Sarah B. Daines, of the Relief Society Board, our oldest Stake officer among the ladies. A cluster of roses, eighteen in number typifying the years of service our President has so signally rendered, marked the end of the program for the entertainers.

In a heartfelt response the President then expressed his gratitude for the good support given him all these years by the auxiliary boards and impressed most indelibly the seriousness of the duty before each board to bring in, through its organization every delinquent member, that all might be prepared for that great event—the dedication of our beautiful Temple.

The refreshments were then served by the Relief Society and Sunday School Boards. The Mutual Association Boards had in charge the program, and the Primary and Religion Class Boards the decorations and arrangements. Great credit is certainly due all who participated in this very pleasing function.

Lectures On The Navy League

Although it was Easter Sunday, the Stake Authorities were pleased to welcome the Dominion Secty, Mr. Gordon Jackson, and the Provincial Secty, Mr. Irvine, at the evening service, March 27th.

There was a large audience to greet the speakers, who were introduced by Mr. F. W. Atkins, the President for the Cardston District, and who, in presenting Mr. Jackson requested a vocal solo, and "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" was rendered in fine style to the evident enjoyment of all present. Mr. Jackson has a voice of exceptional quality and training.

Mr. Irvine of Calgary was next introduced and gave a very succinct account of the Navy League activities and the aid given to the seamen at the great ocean-ports, as well as the help extended to their orphaned children. He congratulated Mr. Atkins upon the good work accomplished in this district, and he felt like he was coming home when journeying to Cardston.

The Male Chorus from the Stake Choir then sang "See the Mighty Angel Flying" in a very acceptable manner.

Mr. Jackson in opening expressed his gratitude and pleasure in being accorded the privilege of guidance through the Temple here by Pres. Thos. Duce. It would afford much to reflect

upon in his moments of meditation. Eulogized Mr. Atkins for his untiring efforts in behalf of the Navy League. In the lives of the Latter-day Saints, doubtless they looked to their Prophet—Joseph Smith—as the great exemplar of their own time, and so too did the British people in the homeland and wherever Britain's flag was borne by her great naval and shipping interests, look to their great hero of the seas—Lord Nelson.
