

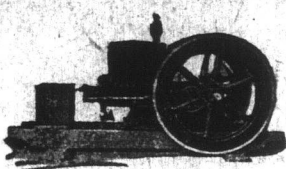

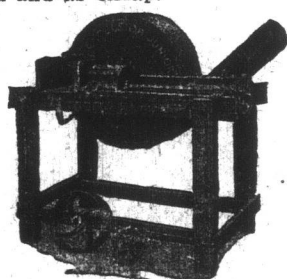

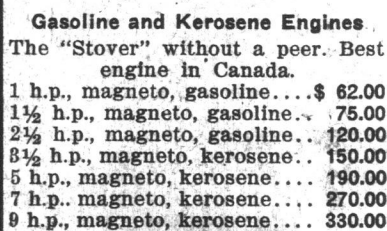

BRANDON WINS
CLOSE CHECKING
CLEAN CONTEST

Winnipeg Argos Defeated in Fast Hockey That Thrilled the Crowd—Score 5-4

M'NEILL HELD SPARROW

On Whom Visitors Depended to do Scoring—W. Mummery Did Not Play

Senior hockey was ushered in at the Arena Saturday night when the Brandon team triumphed over the Argos of Winnipeg by a score of five to four. It was a hard, close checking contest, but there was practically no rough play, six penalties for minor offences being handed out by the officials. Displaying a brand of hockey that was a revelation to the large crowd of fans, the local boys set a terrific pace from the face off and tallied two goals within six minutes and thirty seconds play. There was little to choose between the two teams but the Brandon boys secured the victory by the consistent back checking of the forwards. Without the services of Walter Mummery it was expected that the defence would be weak but the performance of the defence players was very creditable. Sparrow, the Argos' star, was too closely checked to be effective, and he had the busiest night of his hockey career. The visiting team depended a great deal on Sparrow on account of his scoring ability, but he did not get many chances on the net as McNeill was right at his heels every time he made a break. Nicklin, the point man for the Argos, played a fine game and succeeded in breaking up the Brandon line several times when it seemed almost certain that the local boys would get through and score. Binney in goal also performed well and made some difficult stops. The Brandon boys demonstrated to the large crowd of supporters that they have the ability to play hockey and with a little more system will be a hard team to beat. McNeill, Coldwell and Creighton on the forward line played in brilliant form and with better timed and more accurate shooting they should make the best combination in the league. Lynch and Tedder did some fine work on the defence and succeeded in breaking up the combination play of the visitors line with the result that most of the shots on goal were made from a distance and were easy picking for Winkler. Brandon fans had their first opportunity to see Winkler perform and he certainly lived up to his reputation as the premier amateur goal keeper in the West. Suffering from a bad cold, Winkler was not in the best physical condition, but notwithstanding this handicap, he gave a fine exhibition of goal keeping. The game was witnessed by twelve hundred people and the crowd showed considerable enthusiasm and gave the local players plenty of encouragement.

THE YEARLY GRANTS

Must be Increased to Maintain Institution Which Has Proved Useful

A very representative gathering of those interested in the welfare of the Brandon District Rest Room Association met in the "Rest Room," Ninth street, Saturday afternoon, on the occasion of the first annual meeting of the association. Mrs. J. M. Allen, President, presided at the meeting, and gave a most interesting address outlining the work done.

Although it will not be a year until February 15th, since the society was organized, the work of its members since the first meeting has made it possible for Brandon to have perhaps the most successful Rest Room in Canada.

As the report given by the Secretary, Mrs. H. G. Thornton, showed, 8,000 visitors to the city have made use of the Rest Room since it was opened April 13th, which alone would make it worth while. The Treasurer, Mrs. H. Laidlaw, reported total receipts amounting to \$1,933.10, and disbursements, \$1,429.39, which left the gratifying balance of \$503.71 on hand after nearly a year's work. This report was received with evident approval by all present, some of whom were very dubious about the success of the Rest Room when plans were being made for its establishment. In a subsequent discussion of the report, it transpired that the average cost per month, of maintaining the Rest Room amounted to \$44.70.

Mrs. J. S. Lowes, of Roseland, convener of the deputation who were elected to visit the Councils of the municipalities for grants to assist in maintaining the Rest Room, reported the following grants made: Cornwallis, \$200; Whitehead, \$100; Elton, \$125; Daly, \$100; Oakland, \$100. Brandon also contributed \$100 to this amount.

During the afternoon the constitution of the Brandon District Rest Room Association was read and adopted after much discussion. It was also suggested that hereafter those registering put after their name the Municipality they come from, not the post office as has been the case during the past months.

Need Funds for Maintenance.

After last year's business had been transacted, a lengthy discussion as to the ways and means of running the Rest Room for this year took place, a repetition of last year's grants not being sufficient. Among those present who took a keen interest in this part of the proceedings were Alderman-elect A. Shewan, Ald. J. B. Curran, Ald. G. B. Coleman, and Mr. J. M. Robertson, President of the Brandon Retail Merchants' Association. Also Reeves Gerry, Cornwallis; Couling, of Oakland, Davidson, of Elton, as well as a number of Councillors from the surrounding municipalities.

Alderman-elect Shewan, in a short address, congratulated the workers on the success of the Rest Room, and suggested that the representatives of the municipalities meet with the executive at some other time and discuss the way the building should be sustained. He thought this would be a quicker way than trying to come to a definite decision at the meeting.

Alderman Curran thought the ladies should continue to run the Rest Room, and said he would vote toward whatever was necessary to maintain it.

Alderman Coleman, in a lengthy address, suggested that a resolution be passed asking each municipality for a grant of \$200 if that was what they wanted. As those representatives present were probably not authorized to make a grant at the present time. He thought the Rest Room a good thing if it did nothing but bind the municipalities together. This would in the future, if good results were established.

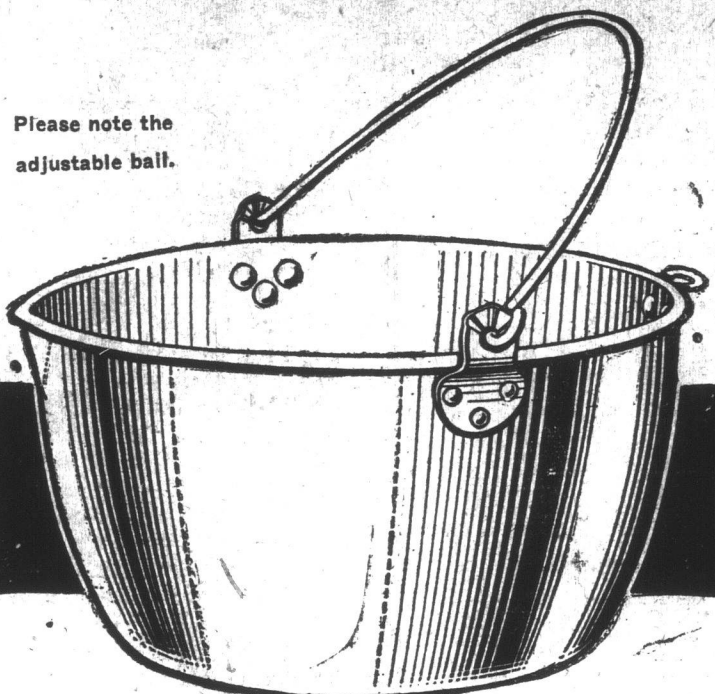

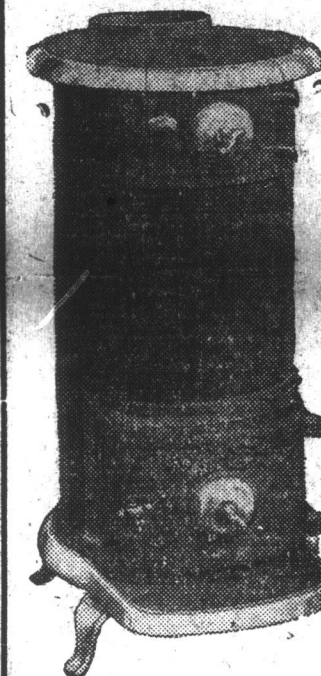

NEW GOVERNMENT

THE HUNS GAVE UP

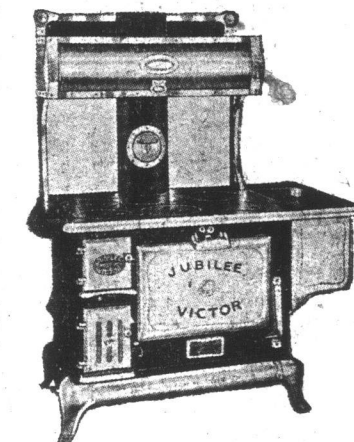
