ZYBYSZKO THREW STECHER

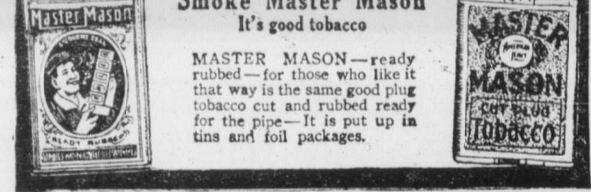

Maritime & Maine Circuit Will Meet

Meeting of Old Organization Is Called for Moncton Next Week—Five of the Members Now in New Circuit Can Control Meeting if They So Desire—Formation of New Inter-provincial Circuit Expected.

Notices have been sent out calling a meeting of the Maritime and Maine Harness Racing Circuit for Moncton on Tuesday, March 22nd. Roy W. Smith, track superintendent of the Fredericton Park Association, is vice-president of the Maritime and Maine Circuit, and the notice for the local racing organization of the calling of the meeting came to him. It is expected that a meeting of the directors of the Fredericton Park Association will be called during the next few days to discuss action to be taken in connection with the call, and it is quite likely that the local track will send representatives to Moncton if there is any assurance that there will be a representative meeting. The notices state that the meeting is called by order of President S. D. Heckbert, at the time prescribed for the annual meeting of the response to the President's call was not sufficient to go on with a meeting, and since then there have been few signs of activity along the lines of reviving the circuit. May Mean New Circuit. Recently, however, Phil Belliveau, lessee of the Moncton track, has been displaying signs of disappointment that Fredericton and other tracks have taken membership in the new Maine and New Brunswick Circuit, and it is believed the calling of the meeting at Moncton is part of a plan of his to organize a new circuit which will be composed of Moncton and other tracks east of there, in Nova Scotia as well as New Brunswick, also including Chatham and perhaps some Prince Edward Island tracks. While Mr. Belliveau intimates in letters recently received here that he blames the Fredericton track officials for the present predicament of his organization, the fact is that the local track managers, like the others, were invited to go into the new organization and accepted the proposition because it looked good—at the same time retaining their membership in the old circuit, the Maritime and Maine Circuit. As a matter of fact, therefore, the tracks which have joined the new circuit—Woodstock, Fredericton, St. Stephen, Houlton and Chatham—among the other members of the old circuit, and if they wished to do so, are in a position to swing any meeting which may be held as they might see fit. There is no indication that such an attitude will be adopted by these members, but so far as the Fredericton Park Association and the other members of the new circuit are concerned, at least, it has not been because of any failure on their part to adhere to the rules and regulations of the old circuit that made the formation of a new circuit necessary.—J. D. B.

WALNUT HALL FILLY BRINGS HIGH PRICE

Iva Lou, 2.09 1-4, at \$1,500 is Second Highest Sale on Opening Day

New York, March 15.—About two hundred head of trotting stock, mostly young animals, were placed on sale yesterday at Madison Square Garden in the blue ribbon spring auction conducted by the Fasig-Tipton Company. The sale will conclude today. No Canadian purchasers figured in the bidding yesterday. The highest price paid yesterday was \$1,525 for the bay filly yearling Frisky Spirit, consigned by the Walnut Hall Farm. Iva Lou, a m. (five), 2.09 1/4, brought \$1,000. The feature of today's sale will be the offer of Adjo Guy, 2.06 3/4, and Grace Direct, 2.06 1/2, both well known prize winners in last season's Grand Circuit events.

THE TEAMS PLAYED UNTIL EXHAUSTED

Montreal, March 15.—Dropping from sheer exhaustion after playing forty minutes overtime, players representing Lower Canada College and Loyola College last night decided to leave their game for the championship of the province of Quebec and the right to go to Toronto to play for the Ontario Hockey Association Memorial Cup undecided. Both teams scored three goals and Lower Canada had the edge in the first two periods, the score then being three to one, but Loyola rallied and tied the score in the last period. The game was originally scheduled between Catholic High School and Lower Canada, but the former were disqualified for playing men over age in the final against Loyola on Saturday.

Vancouver and Ottawas For It

Senators Defeated St. Pats in Final Game 1 or National Hockey League Championship While Vancouver Has Lead of 7 to 0 Over Seattle in Pacific Coast Series—Bill Stewart Shy at "Close In" Hockey.

Vancouver, B. C., March 15.—Playing in championship form here last night against Seattle, Vancouver won the first game of the playoff of the Pacific Coast Hockey Association championship series from the Mets, 7 to 0, and ran up a lead of seven goals, with which to enter the final contest in Seattle on Wednesday night. The locals played a wonderful defensive game and the contest was witnessed by more than eight thousand persons. It was one of the cleanest games of the season. Total goals decide the championship and the right to play Ottawa for the Stanley Cup. The summary: First period: 1—Vancouver, Harris, 10:45; 2—Vancouver, Harris, 12:7. Second period: 2—Vancouver, Skinner, 13:09; 4—Vancouver, Coos, 4:06. Third period: 5—Vancouver, Harris, 4:29; 6—Vancouver, Adams, 2:15; 7—Vancouver, Harris, 6:03. Final score: Vancouver 7, Seattle 0.

OTAWA WON. But St. Pats, with Bill Stewart on the Defence, Made Them Extend to the Limit to Win.

Toronto, March 15.—Ottawa Senators won the National Hockey League championship here last night by 2 to 0 from Toronto. Bill Stewart, the Amberst player, substituted for Sprague Cleghorn, the former Ottawa player on the Toronto team, but although he put up a good game and provided several good rushes and checked effectively at times, his work when close in was slightly off. The Senators had to go the limit to win.
