## PITTSBURG HAVE PENNANT CINCHED

### But Yankees and Cleveland are Evenly Matched in American League

(Associated Press by Leased Wire.)  
 New York, Aug. 22.—The Cleveland world champions and their New York Yankee rivals are stumbling along in their efforts to outdistance each other in the American League pennant race, while Pittsburgh now has little to fear from the New York Giants in the National.

The Indians play host to the Yankees this week and the Pittsburgh team visits New York. A double defeat suffered by the Yankees yesterday while Cleveland was winning put the eastern team 2½ games behind the champions. Pittsburgh is 6½ games ahead of New York.

The American League honors should go to the club whose pitching staff stands for the final spurt next month. New York is outdistancing Cleveland at present, but there is little to choose between the pitching strength of the two teams. Washington is tightening its grip on third place by good pitching.

The Pittsburgh Nationals have a firm grasp on the pennant. If the Pirates win twenty of their remaining thirty-nine games, New York could go into first place only by winning 26 out of 38. Pittsburgh has a marked edge on its rival in both batting and pitching. Since July 20, when the two rivals were tied for first place, the Pirates have won 15 games and lost 13, while New York won 10 and lost 13.


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## Maine and N. B. Circuit

OVER \$27,000 DISTRIBUTED IN PURSES AT THE SUMMER RACES AND NEW RECORDS FOR EACH OF THE SIX TRACKS WHICH STAGED MEETINGS—CALGARY EARL, 2:02½, REPORTED ILL.—OFFER OF \$10,000 FOR DIRECTUM J., 2:01¼, BY DOWN EAST HORSEMAN LOOKING FOR OPPONENT FOR JOHN R. BRADEN, 2:02¼.

The closing of the summer season of the Maine & New Brunswick Circuit with the meeting at Fort Fairfield last week provided some new accomplishments in harness racing in the Down East district that will make food for the gossip on the Hot Shoe Circuit this winter.

Nine meetings have been held since the curtain raised at Fredericton on June 20th and July 1st, and for the first time in history there has been continuous racing without a lull of even a single week. Upwards of \$27,000 has been distributed, and all one or perhaps two of the meetings have been financially successful in spite of the fact that there is a general business depression all over the world and money is not being as generously spent for such purposes as a year or so ago.

The nine meetings that have been staged have taken place over the tracks of six of the members, and as a result all six tracks have new records, while the average time of the season's racing has far outstripped all previous performances. Of the six new track records, John R. Braden, 2:02½, owned by the Musclevik Club of Fredericton, Me., hung up four—2:08¾, at Woodstock, 2:07¾, at Houlton and 2:07¼, at Presque Isle; Roy Yolo, 2:08¼, owned by W. Bert Lott of Fredericton, reduced the Fredericton track record half a second when he won a race in 2:08¾, and last week The Problem, 2:04½, owned by the Caribou Driving Club, in his first race for driver John Willard, reeled off miles in 2:11¼, which gave a new track record to the Fort Fairfield track.

### Some New Records.

The meeting at Fort Fairfield, like all the others on the circuit, provided a new record for at least one new standard performer. This time it was Confection, the rugged four-year-old pacing daughter of The Northern Man, which is owned by Charles F. DeWitt of Bridgetown, N. S. She won her race in 2:17¾ and gave an impressive performance under the direction of "Red" Hanafin, showing that in non-racing years she would have been a good money getter. Baton, the converted Bangra pacer that is being campaigned by his owner, A. M. Nason, of Monticello, Me., reduced his trotting record of 2:19¾, made the

previous week at Presque Isle, to 2:18¼ in the fourth heat of a winning five-heat race. Donald Keilh, the blind pacer that A. DeWitt of Presque Isle, picked up for \$300 last winter, pulled his "winners" record down another peg when College Sweet, 2:11¼, the Woodstock pacer, chased him out in 2:12¼.

Don Q., 2:17¾, another of Allie Nason's string, topped a summary for the first time this season in the final week of the summer section of the circuit, the son of Dan Q. Just equaling his win record of last year, which means he will get no time allowance benefits in 1922. Bravas, 2:15¾, the Reed stable-trotter, also topped a summary for the first time this season when he took the final three heats of a six heats event; but the pacers had raced themselves out in the early stages of the event; but the fastest he had to go was 2:20¾, although Mumps Man, a Woodstock entry, had won the first heat in 2:18¼ and Quinisset, a Fort Fairfield pacer, took the next one in the same time and a third a shade slower. Chines Teal, Jr., the big black trotter which John Willard has been bringing along in a promising manner, brought his record down to 2:18¼, although he failed to win.

### Many Horses Knocked Out.

At Fort Fairfield, as all the way along the circuit, there were a lot of split heat races, and as a result of this succession of grueling battles many of the most hardy and stout-hearted horses are among those which are feeling the effects of the strenuous campaign. Zom Q., 2:09¼, which would always stand up and race week in and week out, is knocked out and may not race again this season, and so are many others, both trotters and pacers—all of which makes the horsemen wonder if the three best plan doesn't give horses just about all the racing they need if they are to stay in good condition for a long campaign. There were smaller fields at Fort Fairfield than at any of the former meetings, partly because so many horses were knocked out and partly because in addition to the New Brunswick stables that had strayed away to the Eastern Circuit, where the campaign was not as roscate as painted, a number of others had jumped to the early fair at Danforth, Me., where they had chances to start every day so long as it didn't rain—and some of them did it, too.

### Disappointing reports as to the condition of Calgary Earl, 2:02½, the trotting owned tree for all, are being discussed. The most authentic seems to be that he is under treatment by a veterinarian for kidney trouble and may not be raced any more this season. If the doctor's orders are carried out. At the same time comes the story that \$7,500 was offered for Directum J., 2:01¼, by a "Down East" horseman who evidently figured he could beat John R. Braden, 2:02½, with him. The offer was refused and later increased to \$10,000. It is said but then the reply was that Directum J. wasn't for sale at any price. The "black bear" made his showing on the Grand Circuit free for aller and would have provided some great races with "the little iron horse."
