## LEGISLATURE'S WORK DONE.

The business of the Legislature for the session has been practically finished, and it is expected that prorogation will take place on Tuesday. The power bill and Long Distance Telephone Company's bill were railroaded through, and other legislation of no small importance was ratified with unseemly haste. Mr. Reed, of South Wentworth, divided the House on the County Councils bill, which was forced through on a party vote by a majority of 39. Some discussion took place on the enormous increase in the expenditure, much of which is caused by making places and salaries for party followers. Mr. Whitney was interrogated about the locations for Normal Schools, but he professed ignorance and said he did not even know if action would be taken this year.

The session has been fruitful of legislation, some of which is of a dangerous character. Yesterday Mr. Evans Gordon, agent of English bankers, waited upon Whitney and talked over the damaging effect the power bill was having on English capitalists. The Premier intimated that "there was no likelihood that the Government would confiscate the property in which they had invested, but would give them just consideration." The fact that the power of confiscation and arbitrarily interfering with the natural course of business is entrusted to men so weak and heady as Mr. Beck and his colleagues creates a menace that will not be to Ontario's credit abroad. The giving away of Cobalt's riches, without taking for the Province more than 5 to 8 cents an acre tax is an outrage and a crime against the public, but it will be a great graft for heeled, who will be taken care of, and should yield much trouble for the party.

## THE FRIENDLY SOCIETIES.

The Montreal Witness advocates an inquiry by the Insurance Commission into the condition of the Friendly Societies. It would do no harm to any society and might tend to place them beyond suspicion, or, if weaknesses were discovered, to direct the application of the remedy necessary. The Witness cites the difficulties found in convincing the Royal Templars' rank and file of the propriety of raising the rates to a safe scale. It thinks that such an investigation would, no doubt, be welcomed by the management, as it would certainly vindicate the course they have been forced to take, and would show that good and honorable men were suffering from the faults of judgment of their predecessors. We think that now that the Dominion Government is looking into the old line companies, Whitney might well set about probing all those under Provincial jurisdiction. It would be reassuring to many members, and it could hurt no society that should be allowed to accept money for insurance. The net result would be good.

## EDITORIAL NOTES.

Whitney thinks if men of undoubted morals are made commissioners his new law will work smoothly. Well, isn't Gamay available?

Hon. Mr. Beck is said to be a little raspy over the power bill. It does not come up to his "ownership and operation" ideas.

Perhaps after a few more expert examinations of the body of the victim of the Barton murder we shall obtain a description that will be really useful.

In April, 1902, Toronto got \$13,242.22 from its street railway. In April, 1906, it got \$28,254. And there are few whose opinion is worth listening to who do not believe that had Toronto operated the road as a municipal venture a big deficit would not be found in the place of that handsome revenue.

The Beck power bill enables the Government to do what the Ross bill of 1903 enabled the municipalities to do. The difference is that it allows the Government to name the commission, to make the bargains, spend the money, collect the tolls and charge everything up with interest and incidentals, no matter how much, to the municipalities. The power to expropriate is, as Beck says, merely "a big stick."

Hon. Mr. Oliver comes in for a dose of editorial abuse from the Toronto World. It declares that he "is a terror to his friends, a source of comfort to his opponents, and altogether an unsatisfactory representative of high officialdom," and leaves nothing unsaid to show that the editor feels very bitter toward him. Oliver being country raised, probably knows that when a fellow skins skunks he must not expect an odor of heliotrope and attar of roses. He counted the cost before he began to flay the World chap.

After all the profusion of promises to safeguard public rights that Whitney has made, it is somewhat disappointing to those who trust him—to find that he is adding difficulties to be met with in dealing with corporation grasp of public franchises. The changes made in the Hendrie Railway bill leave doubts as to the limitation of electric railway franchises to 25 years, and last night he rallied his followers to vote down Mr. MacKay's amendment providing that in event of the country taking over the

telephones the new long-distance company should not be able to make us pay millions for franchise rights. This action is greatly to be deprecated and may prove very costly to the people.

The other day the Toronto Telegram was ripping Senator McMullen up the back, alleging that he was obstructing Hill's railway plans. Last night the Toronto Board of Control read a letter from the Senator, telling them Mr. Hill ought to be presented with bouquets as the only man who had ever offered to build railways in the Dominion without a bonus. Now, see the Telegram eulogize Senator McMullen!

If F. W. Maclean, M. P., has not the hide of a rhinoceros, we shall hear more of that Ingram charge. If he made a declaration that was of the nature of an oath to draw indemnity to which he was not by attendance entitled, while daily raging against the "salary grab," he occupies a rather contemptible position. And why should the Tory leader and followers be so outspoken against his course if the condemnation is undeserved? Mr. Maclean should deal with Ingram. Ingram's withdrawal of the word "perjury" and re-statement of the allegations in equally offensive but Parliamentary language will surely not be passed over by Maclean in silence.

It is estimated that Canada supplies over three-fifths of the world's output of maple syrup and sugar, the average annual production being 17,804,524 lbs., with a money value of \$1,780,452. Perhaps that much real maple product is turned out; but thousands of gallons of "maple" syrup and tons of "maple" sugar never came from that noble Canadian tree acer saccharinum. Efforts are being made to stop adulteration, but at best the supply will never overtake the demand. We have so many synthetic products now that we may reasonably hope for synthetic maple sugar by and by. We get all the various foreign mineral waters synthetically duplicated. We have synthetic drugs in plenty, and the chemists will doubtless give us synthetic maple sugar after the maple forests have been burned up.

The Government wants the patronage in this power matter; the municipalities must pay all the bills and take all the risks. That is not what the Whitney party was pledged to do. Whitney promised to make Niagara power "as free as air." In 1902 the party presented a resolution in the Legislature in which it was declared that Niagara power "should be utilized directly by the Provincial Government in order that the latter may generate and develop electricity and pneumatic power for the purpose of light, heat and power, and furnish the same to municipalities in this province at cost." There is a wide difference between that policy and the Beck power bill.

If Whitney is not dismissing Grit officials fast enough to suit his hungry heeled, he is making quite a lot of new jobs for his friends. The Toronto Telegram publishes a list of some of the plums, which, in the aggregate, amount to about \$35,000. Here is the list:

Most of those jobs are peculiarly attractive, and we expect to see quite a contingent from this city looking for preferment. No time should be lost, for Toronto will be hot-foot after them.

Monday of this week was "house cleaning" day in Chicago. Thousands of school children, hundreds of employees of the street cleaning department, and scores of members of improvement societies joined in an effort to make that city look tidy for once by cleaning the streets, alleys and vacant lots of all rubbish, and having it burned or carted away to the dumps. Mayor Dunne had issued a proclamation calling upon the citizens to observe the day. It was estimated that about 10,500 wagon loads of rubbish were taken away. The school children did the best part of the work. They worked till dark, collecting heaps of rubbish, tin cans, etc., and so pleased were the authorities with the idea that they were asked to continue the work out of school hours for the rest of the week.

Just think of it! We have two members of the Legislature, one a minister and one a committee chairman. There are four members from Toronto, a big legal department and a Council and controllers who watch legislation closely. There is a big legislative committee, and a few score members of parliament, the Premier and his Cabinet. And yet, in all that crowd, whose business it is to make and amend laws, there was not a man able to see that an entire clause in an assessment bill had been struck out and another to rob the municipalities slyly substituted between second reading and committee, till our City Solicitor sent Mr. Frank Hurley down to look into it! No wonder Toronto's solicitor's eyes stuck out when he saw it! No wonder Hon. Mr. Hanna and Mr. Carscallen and the other incompetents were staggered! No wonder Mr. MacKellen is proud of his legislative sleuth. Toronto and Hamilton ought to vote him a medal.
