

## WILL PLACE HIM ON TRIAL,

Although Police Magistrate Dismissed Charge Against Him.

Magistrate and Crown Attorney Have a Sharp Difference.

Richard Solomon, Who Stole From Landlady, Sent Down.

At the conclusion of the case against R. J. Corsar, charged with hitting Geo. Taylor on the head with an iron bar, at Police Court this morning, Magistrate Jells and Crown Attorney Washington had a tilt, which resulted in the Magistrate acquitting the defendant and Mr. Washington determinedly stating that he would proceed against him at the sessions, and expressing himself as surprised at the stand the Magistrate took.

Through George S. Kerr Corsar pleaded not guilty, and declined to elect. Taylor swore that on Friday last he had a fight with Corsar, who is watchman at the Imperial Cotton Co., and as a result he was ordered out of the yard and reported to the superintendent, who told him he had fought in the yard. On Saturday, in company with two other men, he went into the yard with some waste to get it weighed, and Corsar shouted to him that "Perhaps he'd keep his tongue between his teeth now." The complainant replied that he did not have to, and therefore would not. Corsar, he said, ran at him and struck him, and he struck back in self defence, splitting Corsar's lip. The defendant, he said, reached down to the ground and picked up an iron bar struck him on the head with it, inflicting a nasty cut and knocking him out. He went to Dr. Perry's, where his wound was dressed and then he laid the information. Two boys, who were with him, corroborated his evidence.

The Magistrate expressed the opinion that the case was not one to be sent up for trial, and he dismissed the defendant.

"Why should Your Worship take a stand like that, in the face of the evidence that this man knocked this boy down with an iron bar and cracked his head?" asked the Crown Attorney, hotly. "He might have killed him," he added, in a disgusted tone.

"Perhaps he might," replied His Worship, "and it would have served him right. I think that when a man is annoyed by a bunch of dissolute boys and uses force to put them out of where they have no right to be, he should be upheld."

"All right, he'll have a chance to show that; I intend to prosecute him at the December Sessions," stated the irate Crown Attorney.

Richard Solomon appeared for sentence this morning on the charge of stealing \$14 from his landlady. He was sent to the jail for six months.

Stephen Walker sued M. Lewis for \$350 wages. The case was laid over until to-morrow to give the complainant a chance to bring witnesses to show what money was made in sewing men's coats, the work he claims he did not receive enough for.

William McArthur, on a T. R. train, fined \$2 for being drunk on G. T. R. train. Constable Darrook, of the G. T. R. R. was the complainant.

John Rayner was allowed to go at sunrise, after sobering up in the cells.

Box Has Been Sealed and Placed in the Pedestal.

The Executive of the Queen Victoria Memorial Statue Committee met at the residence of the President, Mrs. John S. Hendrie, yesterday. Mayor Stewart was present, and brought the copper box to be placed in the pedestal of the monument. In it were placed copies of the Hamilton Directory for 1907; the Canadian Almanac for 1900, the beginning of Canada's century, and 1907; a paper with pictures of the statue and sculptor, and history of the work of the ladies in getting up the monument; copies of the Times, Spectator and Herald for Nov. 12; a box of coins, including an old copper for 1850, issued by Upper Canada Bank; a one-cent piece, and 5, 10, 25 and 50-cent silver pieces; copies of minutes of the City Council; book of by-laws and financial statement of the city; a parchment, written by William Bruce, giving names of Mayor and City Council, Board of Education, members of Parliament, etc.; small Union Jack and Canadian flags; photos of the city, the Gore and City Hall; copies of the Globe and Mail and Empire of the 13th Nov.; stamps with the Queen's head, also a set of Jubilee stamps, half-cent, one-cent, three-cent, six-cent, eight-cent and ten-cent. These stamps were donated by Mr. Adam Brown and Mr. Geo. H. Bull, and a special vote of thanks was passed to them for their kindness in sending them. There was also a round copper box for the coins, in which, besides those already mentioned, was a collection of old coins brought by Mrs. Ballard.
