Vote Not to Work. Cleveland, April 20.—By a unanimous vote of the 207 members of the Lake Seamen's Union it was decided to go on strike here to-day. A resolution was also passed not to go near the lake car-riers' shipping office, and also not to make application for positions on any vessel under' the control of the Lake Carriers' Association so long as it in-sists upon the open shop clause. It is said that with the present num-ber of non-union engineers under con-tract it will not be possible for the ves-sels controlled by the Lake Carriers' Association to carry over ten million tons of ore.
