Winter Quarters for Troops

The 26th Field Battery, Canadian Overseas Forces, is to be mobilized at Fredericton, and the barracks are now being made ready. Accommodations are to be provided for 166 men during the winter. The two companies of infantry are to be quartered at the Exhibition Building.

Favors Conscription

Chief Justice Landry, addressing the Grand Jury at the session of the Carleton County Supreme Court at Woodstock on Tuesday last week, said he was of the firm conviction in justice to all, conscription should be the law of the land. His Honor has two sons at the front.

True 3-11 for Murder

Woodstock, N. B., Oct. 19.—The Supreme Court in session here, Chief Justice Landry presiding. After the grand jury had been sworn in, an indictment was presented against Charles Smith and Stephen Darrah, charging them with the murder of Fred Green at East Florenceville on May 7th last. The grand jury brought in a true bill against the prisoners.

Her Back Broken

Miss Clara Walls, of Blackville, the young lady who was injured in an automobile accident between Boiestown and Blackville a few days ago, has been operated upon at Victoria Hospital, and Dr. G. C. Van Wart, who is in charge of the case, believes that she is in no immediate danger. The X-ray examination which was made showed that the vertebrae was broken but that there was apparently no serious injury to the spinal cord.—Gleaner.

Tried for Manslaughter

Roumanian King Threatened by People

Over Question of That Country's Intervention in War—May be Popular Rising

London, Oct. 21.—Despatches from Bucharest indicate that a violent campaign is being waged in Roumania over the question of that country's intervention in the war. One of the Bucharest opposition newspapers, according to the despatches, has gone so far as to threaten the King with a popular rising.

Much indignation has been caused in Roumania by the action of the Austrian authorities at Salzburg in arresting Michael Constantine, former Roumanian Minister of Justice, who was returning to Bucharest from Paris, whose arrest, it is alleged, was due to the finding of a letter in his possession addressed to M. Filippesco, leader of the Conservative party in Roumania.
