Re. New School Debenture Issue

The Advocate, having received a number of enquiries from citizens, respecting the new issue of School Debentures for \$35,000, the application of which the Town Council has been asked to support, by the Board of School Trustees, we have gathered the following particulars which we are pleased to publish for the benefit of the public.

The Board of School Trustees has already spent over \$25,000 on the new Bayle School, the new Bute School and the finishing of three new apartments in the Harkins' Academy. Out of savings on their assessments they have been able to pay about \$13,000 on this amount, which still leaves a balance of \$12,000 owing.

\$2000.00 was spent on the Bayle School \$8000.00, on the Bute School and \$15000.00 on Harkins' Academy. This work should have been bonded at the time it was performed, but it was thought by the School Board that the expenditure could be extended over a period of years and thus go away with the issuing of debentures. They now find that the accommodation of the schools is overtaxed, and the rest of the space in Harkins' Academy must be made available for the accommodation of new pupils. To complete this work it will take upwards of \$20,000.00. This amount with a balance of over \$12,000 which they are now carrying, is impossible to provide for out of yearly assessments, without putting too heavy a burden on the ratepayers. The School Board consider that the only feasible way to complete this work will be to issue \$35,000 worth of 30 year debentures. If bonds are issued it will mean an increase in the yearly assessment for schools, of enough money to pay interest and sinking fund on debentures; if no issue is made, it will necessitate large direct assessments for a number of years on the ratepayers, as the new work is deemed absolutely necessary by the School Board.

All present outstanding School bonds are fully provided for by sinking fund, to retire them at maturity.

Commanders Of Military Units In The Province

St. John, Jan. 31.—Announcement was made this morning at military headquarters of the officers who will command the various military units in the province this year. All have served overseas and it was found by General MacDonnell, G. O. C. No. 7 District on his recent trip through the province that the feeling among officers and all other ranks was in favor of the units in all branches of the service being commanded by those who had been on the other side during the war.

The units of the province with their commanding officers as announced by Lieutenant Colonel Sparling, D. E. O., today are as follows:

O., 87th Regiment Headquarters at Woodstock, Lieutenant Colonel L. L. Kennedy, of Centerville; 71st Regiment Headquarters, Fredericton, Major W. H. Laughlin, of St. Stephen; 73rd Regiment, Major C. Donald headquarters at Chatham; 1st Brighton Field Engineers, Lieutenant Colonel W. W. Melville, headquarters at Woodstock; Field Ambulance, Lieutenant G. G. Corbett, and Army Service Corps, Captain A. G. Rainnie.

While no date has been set by Ottawa with respect to camp training, headquarters have recommended June 15 as the date for the opening of Sussex camp. It has not yet been officially announced that there will be a camp there but there is reason to believe one will be held. If so it is expected it will be a very large one, many of those who served overseas being desirous of going in order to meet with those from various parts of the province with whom they fought in France.

Annual Congregational Meeting Of St. James' Church

The annual Congregational meeting of St. James' Presbyterian Church was held in the church, last Friday Jan 30th, at 7.30 p.m. Owing to the severe cold the meeting was not largely attended.

Messrs D. W. Stothart and Allan J. Ferguson acted as Chairman and Secretary, respectively.

The minutes of the last Annual Congregational Meeting which was held on January 27th 1919, were read and approved.

An extension of time was granted the committee, which was appointed to look into several matters in connection with changes to be made in the Act respecting the election of Trustees etc.

The Annual Report for 1920, as published, was adopted.

The Pastor, Rev. L. H. MacLean addressed the meeting and thanked the congregation for the much appreciated support and co-operation given him during the past year. He reviewed the past year's work, which was to him, as well as to the congregation, most encouraging, and he felt that if the present good work was kept up, 1920 would prove a still more satisfactory year than 1919.

A resolution from the Board of Trustees for 1919 recommending that the Pastor's stipend be increased from \$1600.00 per year to \$2000.00 per year was passed unanimously.

Estimates for 1920, amounting to \$5550.00 for current expenditures during the year were discussed, and it was the unanimous opinion of the congregation that the general subscriptions for the year would require an increase of 50% to take care of the expenditures, which would be necessary during 1920.

Mr. Walter Sutherland, chairman of the Manse Com. gave a lengthy report on the repair work which was done on the Manse during the year.
