(Continued from first page.) Government contract at their own price. Yet Mr. Macoun stated that the above contract was all the business he ever did for the Pawtucket Company.

PAID IN ADVANCE. As to the \$70,000 copper contract Mr. Macoun admitted that he got his pay before the larger part of the goods were tested or even delivered. A competing tenderer, who offered copper at a lower price, was refused the contract because he required pay on delivery, while the Government held in his case that there should be no pay until the copper had been received and tested.

Our Federal Representation. (From Hansard.) (Continued from last week.) Sir Frederick Borden—Temporarily maintained. Mr. A. Martin—There are changes in things temporal and things spiritual—and in things military too, I suppose the Minister of Militia (Sir Frederick Borden) would say. Well, there came a change. And why? Is there a doubt about the law? Was the Act of union indefinite? Was there any doubt about it? I believe there was grave doubt. I believe there was doubt about it that the Minister of Justice (Mr. Aylesworth) accepted a retainer from Prince Edward Island to maintain before the Privy Council the right of the province to retain its six members. I think I had the honor—or, I do not know that it was a very great honor; in fact, it was a great pain, I may say—to hear the Minister of Justice, a session or two ago (it was last session, I think) telling this parliament that P. E. Island had no claim to retain its six members. Why should he accept this retainer from Prince Edward Island? Does not the Minister of Justice know the law? Does not he understand the constitution? I suppose the constitution is written so that he who runs may reap. The Minister of Justice may have run, but he could not reap very well. The hon. member for Gloucester (Mr. Ferguson), a gentleman whom I respect, a gentleman who, I believe, is sincere and who is a credit to this House, made some remarks which I find it rather difficult to understand. He spoke of the constitution—the spoke of standing by the rock of the constitution. I know my hon. friend knows the constitution. I know also that he is student enough to be aware that this country has not stood by the constitution. The hon. member is ready to sacrifice New Brunswick in order to stand by the constitution, because he says that, while the province might benefit a little today, it might lose more some other day, and for that reason, he would sooner stand by the constitution. It is not long since the constitution of this country was tampered with, and tampered with without any great benefit to the province of New Brunswick, and I do not know that the hon. gentleman (Mr. Ferguson) stood up in the House to maintain the constitution. It is not long since we had before this House the question of increasing the subsidies of the provinces—last year it was, I believe. The question came up in regard to the provinces of Quebec and Ontario, the two wealthiest provinces of Canada. The constitution said that they were to receive 80 cents per head of the population of 1861, and no more. Did they stand by the constitution in that? No. And there was no such thing as appealing to the Privy Council, no such thing as sending the Minister of Justice a retainer to assist in interpreting the constitution. Not at all; for these provinces were to receive a great advantage. And I want to

THE ELECTION BILL. Mr. Foster explained that the Opposition stood by the position first taken in respect to the election bill, but that negotiations between the leaders on that question had made such progress that the Conservatives were ready to assist the speaker in his present difficulties. No definite announcement can be made at this stage, but it is supposed that the Government will either abandon altogether the objectionable clauses of the election bill, or change them so that they will be free from objection as an interference with the voters' list. It is expected that the clause destroying the secrecy of the ballot will disappear, that interference with British Columbia will be abandoned, and that in Manitoba the intervention will be reduced to a judicial re-arrangement of names where Dominion and Provincial subdivisions are not the same.

NOTES. There are vague threats of the introduction of a closure system, so that "the rule of the majority" may be established, and discussion cut short. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has not advocated this change, but has left it to less responsible colleagues. The Premier easily foresees that his own party will soon be in the minority, and he remembers that in 1896 a closure law would have made his tactics impossible. It is found that these important records, which are essential in the trial of an election were easily accessible and might have been carried off by anyone interested in obstructing the election inquiry. Mr. Clements, Mr. Cockburn and others made a strong case against the Department of Customs on Friday, showing that material used in the Detroit international tunnel is practically all from the United States, and that part of it used on the Canadian side pays no duty. About 100,000 barrels of foreign cement is to be used in the Canadian end of the tunnel. The foreign contractor would not purchase this or any other material from Canada or employ Canadian labor, and the United States custom officials rule strictly in respect to Canadian materials used at the American end.
