WITH THE FARMERS

CONCERNING CREAMERIES

During the past season enquiries have been coming into the office of Mr. Markley, Provincial Dairy Commissioner, from some forty of the most recently settled districts in Alberta, asking for information regarding government operation of creameries.

The information submitted by Mr. Markley may serve to make the system of government creameries more clearly understood. The feature is that the government undertakes the management of the creamery for the equipment of which loans not exceeding \$3,000 are made, and manufactures, carries for and markets the butter on behalf of the persons supplying cream, and manufactures, carries for and markets the butter on behalf of the persons supplying cream.

The memorandum in detail is as follows:

Government Loans. 1. A loan of a sum not exceeding \$1,500 may be approved to a creamery association consisting of five or more shareholders fully incorporated and registered under the provisions of "The Dairyman's Act 1907" towards the equipment of a creamery.

Before the loan is made, however, it must be made apparent that not less than \$3,000 has been subscribed towards the stock of the association.

Departmental Requirements. 2. (1) The creamery association must provide suitable buildings, premises, drainage and a sufficient water supply.

(2) The buildings must be erected and equipped according to plans and specifications approved by the Department of Agriculture.

(3) Supply of cream from at least 400 cows must be guaranteed for a period of not less than five months, during each of at least three years.

(4) The creamery must be located on a site and at a place approved by the Department of Agriculture.

(5) The government pays advances to the persons supplying cream, every month, of such amount as the provincial commissioner estimated to be about two-thirds of the net value of the cream supplied, plus the persons respectively. Such advance payments are made in even dollar amounts at intervals of not less than \$200.

(6) The government pays a rate of not less than one cent per pound of butter, in addition to the charge for manufacturing, and the net amount realized from the butter made and placed in the credit of a loan fund, as above explained. Such sum is, however, not issued until after the loan has been all repaid to the government.

CONVENTION OF FARMERS. The annual convention of the Alberta Farmers' Association will be held in Edmonton on January 13, on the same day as the 12th branch of the Canadian Society of Equity will have a convention of delegates from all parts of the province.

The principal question for discussion at both conventions will be the union of the two societies. At a meeting of the executives of the two societies in the Board of Trade rooms in Edmonton some time ago, a constitution was drafted which will have to be discussed and ratified on the occasion of the annual meeting.

If the constitution is drafted fairly well with the approval of both conventions, a joint meeting will be held on January 14th and 15th, when the union will be completed.

The above dates should be kept in mind by every member of either society as the question of organization among the farmers of Alberta is one of very great importance.
