Solemn Function at St. Patrick's

Bishop Power Celebrates His First Pontifical Mass—Societies and School Children Present Gifts and Addresses.

At 10.30 a.m. yesterday St. Patrick's Church was filled to the doors with a large and devout congregation. His Lordship Bishop Power celebrated his first Pontifical Mass and the church and altar were beautifully decorated for the ceremonial. His Lordship was assisted at the Thron by Revs. Fathers Joy and Sears. St. George's, as chaplains of honor. Revs. Fathers Plippy and Kelly officiated respectively as deacon and sub deacon of the Mass, with Rev. P. McDermott as High Priest and Rev. Dr. Greene as Master of Ceremonies. The officers of the various Catholic societies of the city were present, and when the Mass had concluded the united Catholic societies' address was presented in the sanctuary by Hon. J. D. Ryan, President of the Benevolent Irish Society. The address was as follows:

To the Right Reverend M. F. Power, D.D., Bishop of St. George's, Newfoundland:
May it Please Your Lordship,—
On behalf of the various Catholic bodies mentioned hereunder, we extend to you our sincerest and heartfelt congratulations upon the very great honour that has been conferred upon you by our present saintly and illustrious Holy Father in elevating you to the Episcopacy.
Of this great dignity, you are in every way most worthy. In the tender years of earliest boyhood, like the

rosebud of the dawn of spring, you gave promise of a beautiful life, impregnated with the aroma of virtue. We humbly beg of you a memento in your Holy prayers, and we in turn shall ever pray to God to perpetually bless, assist and protect you in the high and holy office to which He has appointed you.

Labrador News.

The s.s. Solway, Capt. Parsons, arrived at Twillingate at 9 p.m. yesterday and left for St. John's at 4.50 this morning. Capt. Parsons sent the following message to the R. N. Co.: "Arrived at Twillingate on the 26th; light S. W. winds and fine weather all the way north. Returning south foggy at intervals. From Battle Harbor to Sandy Islands, fishing poor to date. From Battle to George's Island to Fish Cove, doing well. From Fish Cove to Smokey's very little done yet. White Bears, nil. At Battle Harbor and Horse H., doing well."

STELLA MARIS REPORT.
Capt. George Barbour, of the Stella Maris, who connected with the Inverness at Battle Harbor last week, handed the following report to Capt. Parsons: "Black ice from Cape Harrison to Helron, lying off shore, but in with the land from Watch Island north. From Cape Harrison to Hlak sign of fish but nothing done. Met all the fleet of floaters going north, poorly fished."

Moroccan Crisis Practically Over.

The Moroccan crisis is practically ended. This is the opinion of the English public which is encouraged in official circles, although the Foreign Office is careful to point out that the negotiations are not of a simple nature but may drag on for months. England gives credit for easing the tension to the Government and the support it received from Balfour. According to English views, Germany made a bluff which was promptly called, and is now preparing to withdraw.

Monarchist Tactics.

LISBON, To-day.
The monarchist invasion of Portugal from the north, to be followed by a peasant rising, which has been expected daily, has not yet materialized. Monarchist agents permit information to the effect that first one day and afterwards that another has been fixed for the outbreak, to fall into the hands of the Government. The provisional administration is thus kept in a state of uneasiness and obliged to maintain expensive means of defence, and commercial and financial interests are kept worried, not knowing the hour when the projected counter-revolution will begin.
