My small nephew has just reached the stage of his existence when he wants to be a fireman. His greatest hero is the chief of the fire department and he would rather watch the passing of the fire teams than a circus parade. When we tell him he may possibly change his mind before he grows up he looks at us with the all-wise eyes of youth and wonders what makes grown-ups say such silly things. Can you remember, masculine reader friends (I wonder if there are any, or if only women read what a woman writes), can you remember the time when you wanted to be a fireman? Of course there was such a time. It seems to me that there is something not quite normal about a boy who has never wanted to be a fireman and a sailor.

What Girl Hasn't Wanted to be an Actress or a Nurse?

Also it must be a very unusual girl who has not at different stages of her career decided to be an actress and a trained nurse. The two professions are expressions of fundamental feminine instincts. The feminine desire to foster and cherish something weaker than itself is a part of the maternal instinct and finds natural expression in the ambition to be a nurse. LESS COAL IMPORTED.—According to the returns of the Municipal Council the coal imports to date are considerably less than those of last year, and on this account the total shortage of Municipal revenue is in the vicinity of \$14,000. The falling off in the importations is attributed to the prevalence of ice on the coast during the past two months, and also to the difficulty of securing freighters, and to the increased freight rates.

A PAIR OF TRAITORS.

EDINBURGH, To-day. Robert Hatterington and Henry Wilson, members of the Glasgow firm of Wm. Jackson & Co., were yesterday sentenced to six months' imprisonment and a payment of £10,000 each, for trading with the enemy in shipping, after being found guilty by the Nova Scotia Court.

NO GENERAL ELECTIONS.

LONDON, To-day. That there should be no dissolution of Parliament, was the decision actually arrived at by the Cabinet meeting yesterday, says the Times to-day. The Ministers decided on a principle that the life of the present Parliament should be extended twelve months and that no municipal elections should be held this year.

TWO ASQUITHS CONVALESCENT.

LONDON, To-day. Lieut. Herbert Asquith, who returned to London recently from the Gallipoli front, where he was wounded, is expected shortly to return to the fighting line. Lieut. Arthur Asquith, another of the Premier's sons, who was wounded in the leg at the Gallipoli front, is expected to return to active service within a fortnight.

WANT REPRISALS.

LONDON, To-day. The anger of the public press is rising daily over the German attacks on shipping, says Reuter's Stockholm correspondent. Newspapers are discussing the question whether in addition to protests, the Swedish Government should not consider adopting some form of reprisal.

THE RUSSIAN RETIREMENT.

PETROGRAD, To-day. The admission is made in an official statement issued at the War Office, that the Russians have retired beyond the lines of lakes at Grodno, less than 16 miles west of Lemberg, their last line of defense in front of the Galician capital.

POPE'S NEPHEWS AT THE FRONT.

ROME, To-day. Three nephews of Pope Benedict XV, sons of his sister, are now at the front with the Italian army. Another nephew, son of Admiral Della Chiesa, who is preparing to join the army, is in the line, in which he is an officer, was received by the Pope.

SUCCESSFUL ITALIAN AIR RAID.

ROME, To-day. A combined raid by Italian naval sea-planes and dirigibles upon Austrian positions on the Isonzo front is described in an official statement. Serious damage is said to have been done to the railroad stations and to the Austrian entrenchments. All the machines returned safely to their bases. The Italian
