BRUSHING THE TEETH.

When the teeth decay more on one side than the other look to the manner of brushing your teeth. You must likely, apply the dentifrice to the brush end, with the right hand, use it first on the left side. The right side gets only what is left. Learn to use

both hands and cleanse one side as carefully as the other. Get a new toothbrush every month and a fairly stiff one. Use dental floss between the teeth once or twice a day. This is not only good for the teeth but also helps to keep the breath sweeter. A list of disease which may be traced to decayed teeth is alarming to the thoughtless parent who has neglected to have her child's mouth duly cared for at home and under the dentist's care.

Brush the teeth night and morning, and if possible, after each meal. It is especially important, however, to remove all decaying particles before going to sleep less they cause poisonous gases in the night when there is not enough saliva in the mouth to prevent harm.

Another effect of bad teeth, aside from spreading germs, is that food, insufficiently chewed, is not properly prepared to enter the stomach and is not so mixed with saliva as to ensure partial digestion before being swallowed.

It is not too often to go to the dentist once in six months for a thorough examination and cleansing of your teeth. A small cavity is easily taken care of and such beginnings of trouble, if taken in time, are a saving of your nerve strength as well as your pocket book.

EARLY MESSAGES

MORE MEN NEEDED.

LONDON, Jan. 4. Representatives of the Government and the Trades Unions met at Westminster to-day, in what is considered a most important conference, to discuss the question of man-power. Geo. Nicholl Barnes, Labor member of the War Cabinet, presided. Sir Auckland Geddes, Minister of National Service, speaking on behalf of the Government, said that the position in the last six months had been completely altered by the Russian situation. Ultimately the balance will be more than equalled by the American armies. During the intervening period, however, a great strain would be thrown on the country's resources. After closest scrutiny of the whole position, said the Minister, the Government was convinced that it would be impossible to maintain the armies in the field unless a large number of men were recruited from the munitions services, not merely for the technical units, but also for the fighting units.

VIOLENT ARTILLERY FIGHTING.

PARIS, Jan. 4. Violent artillery fighting on the Champagne and Verdun fronts is reported in to-day's official communication. A German attack in Upper Alsace was repulsed. Eight German aeroplanes and a captive balloon were brought down yesterday.

FIGHTING IN CAMBRAL.

LONDON, Jan. 4. Local fighting took place yesterday afternoon on the Cambrai front in the neighborhood of the Canal du Nord, without producing any change in the situation, the war office reports. We advanced our line during the night slightly, south of Lens. There was some hostile artillery activity in the Bullecourt sector and also in the Ypres sector.

WILL RECOGNIZE BOLSHIEVIKI.

LONDON, Jan. 4. Developments in the Austro-German negotiations, the Daily Chronicle says, are likely to cause the Western Powers to give de facto recognition to the Lenin Government in Russia. A statement of the Entente Allied policy of a democratic character, it adds, shortly will be sent to Russia. M. Litvinoff, who has been appointed Ambassador to London by the Bolsheviki, the Chronicle continues, may receive de facto recognition as Ambassador, while Sir George Buchanan, British Ambassador to Russia, who is on his way home, may be replaced by a diplomat in sympathy with the ideas of revolutionary Russia.

MORE PEACE VIEWS.

LONDON, Jan. 4. There were two distinct tendencies noticeable in the enemy delegation to the Brest-Litovsk meeting, the Petrograd correspondent of the Daily News says. One was annexationist and was represented by General Von Hoffman. A more moderate view was upheld by Foreign Secretaries Von Kuehnelman and Czernin. General Von Hoffman took the purely military point of view and complained with great bitterness that the Russians were using the armistice to negotiate among German soldiers. According to German correspondence there is a belief among the Russian delegation that Germany will yield to Russian demands concerning Poland and Lithuania so as not to lose the advantage of the gain of seeming to agree with Russia while the Entente Allies disagree. The reasons for greater publicity, and this view is expressed in a Bolsheviki statement, are that while we recognize that Stockholm is not very neutral, it is anyhow more neutral than the German headquarters. The Daily News correspondent was present at the Smolny Institute, the Bolsheviki headquarters, when M. Kamenoff, one of the Russian peace delegates, presented his report on the negotiations at Brest-Litovsk. Among other things, M. Kamenoff's report showed, he says, was that the Germans attempted to bind Russia to their country by an extent resulting in a situation which was one of the causes of the war. The Germans made other proposals, all for the purpose of obtaining a position of most favored nation. The Russians stated that they believe in an equality of trade and that at the very moment when they are engaged in socializing industries, nationalizing banks, etc., they could not subscribe to principles contrary to socialism. On this point, the correspondent says, the Germans seem to have receded from their position. Speeches by soldier delegates describe the appalling conditions in the army which is disorganized and poorly clothed and starving. Even the artillery horses have died from lack of food. Nevertheless all the delegates asserted the soldiers were willing to continue the war, notwithstanding these desperate conditions, unless the Germans agreed to peace on the lines laid down by the Bolsheviki.

UNDER GERMAN RULE.

PARIS, Jan. 4. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—In connection with the report that the Germans at Brest-Litovsk claimed that the natives of German colonies were wholeheartedly loyal, Commandant de Civrieux, writing in Le Matin, points out that German official figures show that German frightfulness reduced the population of Togoland from two and one half millions to a little over a million in seventeen years. He also emphasizes that the Germans in Southwest Africa, when they surrendered, begged to be allowed to retain their arms because they feared they would be massacred by their native auxiliary.

WILL RETAIN HUGHES.

MELBOURNE, Aus., Jan. 4. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—The Nationalist Party has resolved by a vote of 43 to 2 to retain Premier Hughes in the leadership.

"A GREAT IMPERIALIST"

LONDON, Jan. 4. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—The Times in a highly eulogistic article headed "A Great Imperialist," says that although Sir Edward Morris has resigned the Premiership of Newfoundland, his public career is probably by no means over. He is still in his prime and may possibly undertake legal work before the Privy Council. Many of his friends in Newfoundland desire that he permanently represent the Colony here. Such an office would be a fitting crown to a career of distinguished Imperial service.

THE WASHINGTON AMBASSADOR.

LONDON, Jan. 4. It is suggested editorially by the Daily Chronicle, that either Viscount Grey, former Foreign Secretary, Earl Reading, Lord Chief Justice, or J. Austen Chamberlain would be acceptable as Ambassador at Washington.


