HUGHES ON PEACE.

LONDON, Oct. 10.

(Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency).—

Hughes, of Australia, address-

ing the Australian business men in Lon-

don, declared that Germany knows she

is beaten, hence the Socialists, who

are the tools of autocracy, get a place

in the Ministry. The Kaiser's and

Hindenburg's new Chancellor struts

about the stage and talks about democ-

racy and love of peace, while the

Boches applauds, adjourns, and

plays out the solemn farce. He de-

clared that Germany's offer was a

trick to avoid the penalty for her

defeat. The courage and tena-

city, with which the Empire's troops,

after withstanding terrific onslaughts

last spring had again resumed the of-

fensive system in the west, which he

claimed to be impregnable, is a feat

of which we are all justly proud, and

one for which the Empire will ever be

grateful. Premier Hughes said: "All

the world knows that Prince Maxi-

milian of Baden speaks not for the

people, but for Hindenburg and the

Kaiser. Moreover, Prince Maximil-

ian's letter to Prince Hohenzollern

shows that his attitude towards democ-

racy is, if the people of Germany

are sincere, let them prove it by

deeds. If they abhor the Kaiser and

military autocracy, let them show the

world by deeds that they do so. Do

they think by this casting white about

peace, which is drowned by roaring

flames, and the crash of the falling

walls of France and Belgium's fair-

est cities, to escape the penalty of the

crimes? The present peace move-

ment will be followed by others more

sunningly devised, but they shall

fall because the people of the world

will not listen to whines about peace,

until the Tiger's claws and cut and

teeth drawn. Some people ask

why will peace come. In view of re-

cent developments in the military

situation, the final crash of the Hun

may break upon our ears very soon.

Referring to raw materials, Premier

Hughes reiterated that there would

be enough to go round after the war.

We must be just to our Allies and our

enemies. Germany has occupied France

and Belgium and she now asks for

her share of raw materials. Well let

her have it, but not until she puts

France, Belgium, Italy and all the

allied nations in a position to com-

pete on terms of equality with her.

Let her rebuild the ruined cities, and

factories of France and Belgium; let

her replace the machinery of France

she has wantonly destroyed or stolen;

let her hand back those patterns and

trade secrets which she has also

stolen, and let her compensate French

and Belgian manufacturers and work-

men. (Applause).
