**Current Radio**

**The Simplest Crystal Receiver**

EDITED BY JOHN M. CLAYTON.

The receiver about to be described can be constructed for about four or five dollars, exclusive of aerial and ground wires, insulators and headset.

The set will have a reliable range of 500 miles under average weather conditions, and if a good antenna, good ground and a good crystal are used it will be perfectly possible to receive over distances of 1,000 miles.

The panel is a piece of 1/4-inch wood. If the wood is dried thoroughly in an oven it is just as good as hard rubber or bakelite. The sub-base is also made of wood. The panel can be any size. We suggest 6 inches by 8 inches as a convenient one. The sub-base is attached to the panel by means of No. 6 wood screws 1 inch long. A simple crystal stand can be purchased for 25 cents. Take the stand off its base and mount in the position shown in the drawings. A .001 Mfd. mica fixed condenser can be bought for 50 cents. It should be screwed to the base in the location indicated. Four binding posts will be needed. They cost 40 cents. Two switch arms and 20 switch contacts will also be needed.

The coil is wound on cardboard tube 4 inches in diameter and 4 inches long. Get one-quarter pound of No. 22 Double Cotton Covered magnet.

**VICTORIANS WIN STANLEY CUP.**

VICTORIA, B.C., March 30.—The Victoria Cougars became the undisputed champions of the professional hockey world and holders of the coveted Stanley Cup Trophy that goes with the title, when to-night they thoroughly defeated Montreal Canadiens, champions of the National League and, until this evening, possessors of the Cup, by a score of 6 goals to 1.

**Record Of Modern Stanley Cup Series.**

Following is the record of the Stanley Cup games since the present world series arrangement was inaugurated:

1914—Toronto beat Victoria three straight games.

1915—Vancouver beat Ottawa three straight games.

1916—Canadiens beat Portland three out of five games.

1917—Seattle beat Canadiens three out of four games.

1918—Toronto won from Vancouver.

1919—The influenza epidemic stopped the Canadiens-Seattle series.

1920—Ottawa beat Seattle three out of five games.

1921—Ottawa beat Vancouver three out of five games.

1922—St. Patrick's of Toronto beat Vancouver three out of five games.

1923—Ottawa beat Vancouver, three out of four games and then beat Edmonton two out of three games.

1924—Canadiens beat Calgary Tigers three straight games.

**AMERICAN TOBACCO CO.**

NEW YORK, March 28.—Adverse criticism in some quarters when American Tobacco raised its common dividend rate to 14 per cent. from 12 per cent. last October, has been stillified by publication of 1924 earnings. Net last year was \$20,754,569, equivalent to over 18 per cent. on \$97,630,356 combined common and common B stocks.

This earning power in a year of most severe competition has demonstrated the dividend increase entailed no departure from conservative policy, but was a justifiable passing on to stockholders of benefits of more profitable business.

To be sure, common dividends totaled only 12 1/2 per cent. in 1924, since the rate was not increased until the last quarter. As it was, the distribution on the junior stocks aggregated \$12,202,675, against indicated \$13,668,333

this year, at rate of \$7 a share on the \$50 par stocks. Surplus was added in 1924 to extent of \$5,420,212. Even if \$7 a share had been paid for the full year there would have been carried over to surplus over \$3,900,000, or \$800,000 more than in 1923.

**Working Capital High.**

American Tobacco entered 1925 with working capital of over \$87,000,000 against about \$85,500,000 the previous year. Balance sheet indicates an extremely liquid condition. Ratio of current assets to current liabilities is better than 11 to 1. Cash on hand is almost \$15,000,000, while total current liabilities aggregate only \$4,462,000. Of this amount \$2,157,000 is accounts and bills payable, representing a striking decrease from \$9,700,000 in the previous year.

Dividends on common and Class B common stocks are the largest ever paid by a tobacco company in this country. Notwithstanding that they took over \$12,200,000, the company put back into the business out of earnings last year practically 44 cents for every \$1 paid common stockholders.
