STREET WATERING .- We commend the following remarks, which we copy from ge, to the consideration of the city authorities: "It is suggested that the water thrown on the streets can be I made an effective sanitary agent. It is found that by mixing in the water the salts of sodium and calcium, the rapidity of the evaporation is arrested, and the streets are rendered damp enough to lay it the dust and render it much more comfortable on a hot day, while the atmosphere is less humid. This effects a great saving in water, and is in other ways beneficial. The utility can be carried a step farther, however, by distributing with the water some simple and powerful disinfectant, which would gradually percolate into the beds of filth beneath the cobble stones and destroy one source of disease.
