New York, Feb. 22.—The retailers have not as yet raised the price of coal because of the Reading combination, but they will do so at the first intimation that the producers intend to starve the market. A reporter talked with 23 retailers, wholessalers and peddlers. They all told virtually the same story. They are awaiting developments, meanwhile practically enforcing the circular price that was adopted last August. The basis of the retail circular of August was \$5 25 a ton for the various sizes of white ash coal and \$5 85 for the red ash. All dealers fear that the first step of the combination will be to curtail the production to such an extent as to create a demand, which naturally would cause an advance of prices all around. The present naturally are very fair to consumers and sellers, and both would be satisfied to have things go on on the present basis. They say it would be unwise to check the present demand by raising the prices to consumers. Wholesale prices have stiffeness the combination.
