A MUSICAL FEAST.

Splendid Success of the London Choral Society's Concert.

Clever and Classical Performance Enjoyed by a Large and Critical Assemblage.

The London Choral Society last evening gave the best concert that has been given in the city for a long, long time, and the City Hall was crowded. Conductor Roselle Pococke has evidently been making good use of his time, and deserves to be richly congratulated and rewarded. Speaking first of the society's work, it was good, and opened with the pretty choral song from "Lohengrin," which they sang very nicely; but if we may choose, the stirring sea song of the vikings went splendidly, and called forth a rousing encore. Next for choice came the beautiful "Vaie of Rest" of Mendelssohn; but all was good, both in intonation, precision and light and shade. Mr. Fred Jenkins, who has been heard here before when he resided in Hamilton previous to removing to Cleveland several years ago, appeared, and made a great impression. His first number was Stephen Adams' "Star of Bethlehem," which he sang with great expression, and, being recalled, gave "My Sweetheart When a Boy." But it was in the great aria from Handel's oratorio, "Samson," "Why Does the God of Israel Sleep," that Mr. Jenkins displayed his great powers as an oratorio singer, his fine voice and great declamatory power gave such a rendition of this masterpiece as has not been heard in London for a long time, and the difficult runs were executed with a clearness that won admiration. Being recalled he responded with the pathetic air from the oratorio, "Total Eclipse," and again displayed his great ability in another style. The sensation—we use the word advisedly—was Miss Evelyn DeLatre Street, daughter of Judge Street, late of this city, whose playing amazed every one. The young lady has a great future—her purity of tone and technique developed more and more as she proceeded, and one did not know which to admire most, the way she overcame the difficulties of the opening movement of Ernst's glorious composition or the pure breadth of tone of the second. In response to a most pronounced recall, she played the charming little number, "L'Abelle," by Schumann. At her later reappearance she played most exquisitely a polonaise by Wieniawski—and in being recalled gave in a chaste manner a beautiful piano-simo berceuse, by Simon. London will be anxious to hear its charming and talented citizen again at an early date. Mrs. Macklecan was in particularly fine voice, and more than pleased her many London admirers. She gave the song "Lucy Gray," by Blumenthal, and secondly, "The Carnival," by Molloy, and was enthusiastically recalled both times. In answer to the first she sang a very pretty, plaintive little song, which was greatly admired. Mr. Furness appeared twice, and displayed his old-time good voice and vigorous style in "The Tilt Death," by Mr. Fred L. Evans presided at the piano, and the mention of that gentleman's name means that considerably more than satisfaction was given—in fact, perfection. Mr. Pococke and the committee of the society are to be highly congratulated on their great artistic success, and also on the crowded house. It is to be hoped that they may be encouraged to further good work and meet with equal success.

SMOKE AND FLAME.

Terribly Disastrous Fire in a New Brunswick Village.

ST. JOHN, N. B., April 23.—The worst fire ever seen in this vicinity occurred at Victoria Corner at noon. The fire caught in a barn by a spark from a flue. A fierce wind was raging and the flames in a minute were beyond control. A number of buildings were burned, and the flames spread through the wood for two miles. Panic reigned as the fire was sweeping everything before it. Loss on buildings will amount to about \$10,000.

AURORA, Ont., April 23.—Fire broke out in W. X. Andrew's store last evening about 6:30, caused by some light wires in connection with the electric light. Fortunately, the fire was discovered before making scarcely any headway, and only slight damage was done.

GEORGETOWN JUNCTION, Ont., April 23.—About midnight last the fine new residence of C. H. Murray, sixth line of Esquimaux, was totally destroyed by fire. The family barely escaped with their lives. Loss, \$3,000; no insurance.

DISORGANIZED MILITIAMEN. WINDSOR, Ont., April 23.—A few members of No. 4 company, Twenty-first Battalion Essex Fusiliers, met at Walkerville tonight to consider the question of changing their company's headquarters from Amherstburg to Walkerville. The company have become practically disorganized, and it was decided to meet tomorrow evening to decide on a new body of men will have to be enlisted, and nothing but the name will remain of the Amherstburg company except a few men who hold together with D. WORK AND WAGES.

Baltimore's Baseball Club To Be Boycotted.

New York Tailors on Strike—Thousands of Operators Involved.

BALTIMORE, Md., April 23.—The Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners have decided to wage war upon the Baltimore Baseball Club, and from now until the trouble is settled all union men affiliated with the Federation of Labor are requested by the carpenters to taboo the champions. The trouble grew out of the construction of the new grand stand. The contractor employed some non-union carpenters, although paying union wages. It was decided last night to push the boycott in every city where the Baltimore team appears.

NEW YORK, April 23.—Two thousand tailors on the East Side went on strike today. The strike was declared by the Tailors' Progressive Union. Some thousand women, girls and boys, whose work depends on the tailors, have also been thrown out of employment. The strike is conducted in an orderly manner. The tailors on strike are those who produce the highest grade work on ready made clothing. Up to the present time they have received \$1 for making a coat. A good workman, it is said, can do this work in six hours. The tailors, after the strike of last September, signed an agreement consenting to work for that price, the agreement to last till May. The employers now want to extend this agreement for another year, but the tailors want an increase of 10 per cent on sack coats and 15 per cent on overcoats, and a letter requesting this change was sent by them to the contractors a week ago. The employers, however, declined to pay the extra 10 of 15 per cent.

NEWCASTLE, Pa., April 23.—One thousand workmen struck today, and every furnace in Newcastle is idle tonight. The men asked that the old wages of 1892 be restored.
