Four years ago Rev. W. J. Clark was inducted into the pastorate of the First Presbyterian Church, and the congregation last evening held an anniversary service and a social gathering. Mr. Robt. Reid, as chairman of the board of managers, and Mr. John Cameron, representing the session, made congratulatory addresses. Rev. W. J. Clark followed in reply and spoke on the work of the congregation. In 1890 there were 182 members on the roll; at present there were 415. In 1889 the church collected slightly over \$3,000, including a \$500 legacy; last year the congregation gave over \$9,000, which included the church building fund. The choir supplied several choice anthems, and Miss Lillywhite sang a solo very sweetly, accompanied by Mr. Barron on the organ and Mr. Saunders on the 'cello. The gathering then adjourned to the lecture room, where refreshments were served.

Several accounts were paid; one from the Canadian General Electric Company was referred to the finance committee, and the sum of \$250 was placed to the credit of the school board.
