—The Misses M. and E. Flint, of London

Brick street, and Miss Fanny Flint, of
Byron, have returned home from Montreal
and the Thousand Islands.

—Police Magistrate Parke yesterday ad-
judged the charges of cruelty to a horse
and larceny against John Paddon until
Friday. They were preferred by the chief
of police and Wm. Wilson respectively.

—Rev. H. C. Speller, of De Lande, Fla.,
formerly pastor of the Adelaide Street
Baptist Church, is visiting friends in the
western section of Ontario. Mr. Speller is
accompanied by Mrs. Speller and family.

—Mrs. H. Simon and Miss Simon, of
this city, were in Hamilton on Tuesday
attending the wedding of Mr. Harry G.
Levetts, of Montreal, and Miss Lily
Birkenthal, a popular and accomplished
lady of the Ambitious City.

—Sir John C. Bray, K.C.M.G., a noted
Australian statesman who visited these
parts eight years ago, died recently. He
was a nephew of the late William Bray,
of Petrolia, and cousin to Dr. Bray, of
Chatham, and Rev. Horace Bray, of
Thamesville.

—Mr. James Lutman, assistant relief in-
spective, climbed to death an applicant for
relief in the inspector's office yesterday.
The caller was in the shape of a large
tarantula that had strolled in from a near-
by fruit store. Mr. Lutman had a regular
war dance after the animal. It measured
about three inches across.

—While making a return trip to the city
yesterday the steamer Thames was slightly
disabled. The paddles of the boat struck
a log and five of the buckets were broken.
About 300 passengers were at Springbank,
but Capt. Argo Foster had them brought to
the city in cabs and rowboats. The crowd
was well pleased with the genial captain's
good management.

—Mr. Patrick Tynan drew his usual
pension envelope at a city bank yesterday,
and on opening it in the street found a few
minutes later a teller told him he was given
the proper amount, but as Mr. Tynan is
willing to take oath that he spoke to no one
between receiving and opening the envelope,
he is very much perplexed. He could ill
afford the loss.

—The teachers and children of Christ
Church Sunday school, to the number of
300, enjoyed their annual picnic at Spring-
bank yesterday. On arrival of the boat at
the waterfront, a dinner was had in the
dining hall, after which the children
separated and rambled about for an hour
or so. A programme of games of various
kinds was carried out, and some good
prizes distributed to the lucky ones.

—Walter Woolway was brought before
Judge Wm. Elliot this morning, and first
elected trial by judge on the charge of
having stolen a gold watch from Thomas
Logan. He afterwards entered a plea of
guilty. Sentence will be passed on Tues-
day. Woolway will also have to answer
the serious charge of robbing the postoffice
at Melrose on June 30 of \$8 50. Squire
Smyth will hear this case on July 10.

—The Rev. A. Parent, a veteran mis-

the Province of Quebec, has been lecturing
in this Province for the past few months in
the interests of missionary work, and is
now in this city, and will remain here for

Canada's Great Fair for 1894.

The Toronto Industrial Exhibition has
now become one of the great events of the
year in Canadian history, and is looked
forward to by the people in all parts of the
Dominion. We have received a copy of the
prize list for this year's fair, which is to be
held from the 3rd to the 15th September
next. The amount of prizes offered is as
large as ever and there is every prospect of
this year's show excelling all others, and
the directors have voted a large amount
for novelties and special features which are
bound to attract the people. The grounds
are also being vastly improved this year.

The Pullman Strike.

It was hinted yesterday by railroad men
that the strike on the C. and G. T. would
affect the G. T. R. in this city at midnight.
By those who are in a position to know it
is denied that the strike will reach this city
at all. Superintendent Tiffin spent yester-
day in Sarnia, and returned on the Erie
last night. It is said that American
organizers were in Sarnia yesterday, but
met with very indifferent success, and it is
believed that the men will be loyal to the
company. The Erie was made up in Sarnia.
One Pullman car came in on it, and two
more were added here and carried east.
Railroad men who were in Port Huron
yesterday say that the firemen are asking
to be re-employed. It is thought over
there that citizens will force the two
parties to arbitrate.

A Successful Pastorate.

Four years ago Rev. W. J. Clark was
inducted into the pastorate of the First
Presbyterian Church, and the congregation
last evening held an anniversary service
and a social gathering. Mr. Robt. Rehl,
as chairman of the board of managers, and
Mr. John Cameron, representing the ses-
sion, made congratulatory addresses. Rev.
W. J. Clark followed in reply and spoke
on the work of the congregation. In 1890
there were 182 members on the roll; at
present there were 415. In 1889 the church
collected slightly over \$3,000, including a
\$500 legacy; last year the congregation
gave over \$9,000, which included the church
building fund. The choir supplied several
choice anthems, and Miss Lillywhite sang
a solo very sweetly, accompanied by Mr.
Barron on the organ and Mr. Saunders on
the cello. The gathering then adjourned
to the lecture room, where refreshments
were served.

After the Collector.

There was a meeting of the London West
Council on Tuesday night, and Reeve Mac-
donald informed the members present that
a warrant had been issued for the appre-
hension of the late tax collector, John
M. Lord. The Reeve fully explained the
situation in regard to Mr. Lord's books
and the collector's probable deficiency. The
whereabouts of the late official is still
unknown to the authorities. Bylaws were
passed for the appointment of John Simp-
son as clerk and James H. Jones as col-
lector, Mr. Jones to receive a commission of
1 1/2 per cent on all moneys collected. H. B.
Tozer applied for the position of assessor,
at a salary of \$60, or \$85 with an assistant.
The appointment was deferred until the
next meeting. Sheriff's Officer Graham
produced the books of the village, which
were in possession of the ex-clerk. An
account of \$4 from Wm. Spence, deputy
returning officer, for rent of a polling booth
at the election, was laid over. Several
accounts were paid; one from the Canadian
General Electric Company was referred to
the finance committee, and the sum of \$250
was placed to the credit of the school
board. A special meeting will be held on
Thursday next to discuss breakwater
affairs.
