Toronto, Ont., June 21-8 p.m.—In-
tense heat is now prevalent in the
Northwest Territories as well as in
Manitoba, and while thunderstorms
are reported from some few places,
clear skies have been generally preva-
lent. Temperature of over a hundred
degrees in the shade are reported from
Assiniboia, and of 90 degrees and up-
wards from Manitoba. Thunderstorms
have occurred in the Province
of Quebec, but in Ontario fine,
warm weather has prevailed. Mini-
mum and maximum temperatures:
Victoria, 54-62; Calgary, 60-92; Prince
Albert, 66-94; Swift Current, 62-104;
Qu'Appelle, 60-100; Winnipeg, 56-92;
Port Arthur, 52-76; Parry Sound, 52-82;
Toronto, 52-82; Ottawa, 56-86; Montreal,
60-80; Quebec, 60-80; Halifax, 50-78.
Local temperatures—Highest, 81.5°;
lowest, 48°.

sociation.

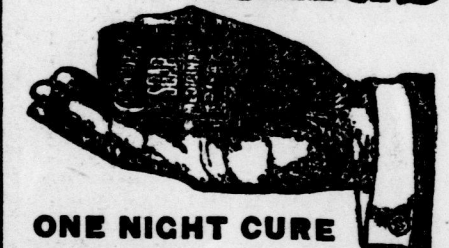
Dairy Salt Tests.

The necessity of using pure salt is
apparent to every butter and cheese
maker. In butter making it serves
three purposes. First, it aids in the
removal of buttermilk and surplus
moisture, salted butter containing less
water than unsalted as a rule. Second-
ly, it aids as a preservative, and third
it helps to improve the flavor of the
butter, which, from our standpoint, is
the most important. In a recent study
of this subject by the Wisconsin Ex-
periment Station, it was found that it
was more difficult to evenly distribute
a coarse-grained salt throughout the
butter than a fine one, but that the
difference in weight of the finished
butter was 1.8 per cent more when the
coarse salt was used. On the whole,
salt with a medium-sized grain that
was flat and flaky gave the best satis-
faction. For cheese making a coarser
salt than for butter is preferable.

The chlorides of magnesium and of
calcium give to butter its bitter flavor.
These two chlorides tend, probably, to
bring about a slow decomposition of
the butter fat, which accounts for the
unpleasant taste. While, therefore,
their presence may not be noticeable
in fresh butter, it becomes apparent
in butter kept in storage for any
length of time and hence is particu-
larly objectionable in salted butter in
the manufacture of butter not intended for
immediate consumption. Analysis
showed that the following may be
taken as fairly representative of the
best brands of dairy salt used in this
country: Sodium chloride, 98.32; cal-
cium sulphate, 1.1; calcium chloride,
0.27; magnesium chloride, 0.18 per
cent. The total amount of impurities
in the ten leading domestic brands
ranged from 0.66 to 2.56 per cent, aver-
aging 1.60 per cent, but the percentage
of impurities is of less consequence
than their character.
