

I welve Years on the London Sale Exchange.

Some Figures Showing Magnitude of the Local Trade.

Over \$2,000,000 Was Paid Out at the London Board Meetings During This Period.

During the past 12 years, figuring on averages, no less than \$2,153,124 has been paid local cheese manufacturers on the London Dairymen's Exchange. It is a big sum of money, and yet it does not represent, by any means, the total output of the factories of this district. The statistics of the period, as gathered from the records of Secretary J. A. Nelles, are highly inter-

During the past twelve years the total sales on the local board amounted to 372,191 boxes, which, at an average of 65 pounds to the box, would equal 24,192,415 pounds. The average price paid during the period was 8.9

cents per pound. The largest sales during the period were made in 1897, when 47,775 boxes were disposed of at an average price of 8% cents per pound, the lowest price being 7% cents and the highest 91/2 cents.

The sales during the past season have been the smallest during the twelve years, but 9,298 boxes having been turned over. The prices, however, were very satisfactory, the average being nearly 9 cents—8 31-32 cents, to be exact. The lowest price paid during the year was 8 1-16 cents and the highest 9% cents. There can be no doubt that sales reached the low tide mark during the past season, and that they will from now on steadily advance in volume.

The highest price was reached in

1899, when some lots went for 11% cents; the lowest price, in 1895, when \$ 1-16 cents was accepted. The highest average price was obtained in 1893-9% cents.

To carry this product of the factories out of the county of Middlesex would require nearly 900 full-sized freight cars, forming a train about six miles in length. If one were to go still further and figure out the number quarts of milk required to make this quantity of cheese, some idea of the magnitude of the dairying industry

of Middlesex might be obtainable.
