BRIDEGROOMS CAPTURED
They Meant to Run Away While the Brides Waited.
Both the Schemers are Now Safe in Jail—No Weddings.

New York, Aug. 21.—Ralph Schatzel and Anton Meserole, watchmakers, who live at 144 Varet street, Williamsburg, were to have been married on Sunday night, Schatzel to 21-year-old Marie Meserole, of Wallabout street, and Meserole to Eva Aulia, of 309 Johnson avenue. Neither wedding took place, because the men failed to appear at the appointed time.

Miss Aulia's wedding was to have taken place at 5 o'clock. During her engagement to Meserole she advanced nearly \$400. He appeared at her house on Sunday about two hours before the time set for the wedding. He wore a light suit of clothes. One of the guests remarked that Meserole's wearing apparel seemed out of place on such an occasion. The expectant bride called Meserole aside and, it is alleged, she gave him \$25 and told him to invest it in dark suit.

Meserole thanked her and went away. He failed to return, and after waiting until night the unhappy young woman dismissed the wedding guests. In the meantime Meserole had met Schatzel and told him he had concluded not to marry. Schatzel, whose marriage to Miss Napes was to have taken place at 7 o'clock, decided on a similar course and both men determined to go to Maine. Meanwhile Miss Napes and Schatzel were waiting at the hotel.

At 9 o'clock, when Miss Napes called off the marriage and dismissed her guests. As she had advanced Schatzel \$175 she delayed to have him arrested and on Monday she went to the Ewen street police court where she met Miss Aulia and learned her errand. Both women obtained warrants on the charge of grand larceny, and two policemen who went in search of the watchmakers came across them Monday afternoon at Schatzel and Meserole were about to embark in a steamer going to Maine. They were taken to Williamsburg and locked up in the Stagg street police station.

Magistrate Steers each expressed a willingness to marry the complainants. The young women, however, were determined to prosecute the watchmakers in default of \$500 bail pending a hearing.

MORE CASES OF ALBINISM IN BIRD AND ANIMAL LIFE
Interesting Letter From Supt. MacCallum of London Asylum.

He Ascribes Condition to Presence of Tape Worm in Intestines.
The interest being taken by students of natural history in the curious find of two white robins, made by Mr. Richard Lucas a couple of weeks ago, and chronicled in The Advertiser, is evidenced by the following letter, written by Dr. G. W. MacCallum, the new superintendent of the London Asylum.

Dr. MacCallum has devoted his much time and study to natural history, and his opinions are regarded as worthy of great consideration by his fellow-ornithologists. Dr. MacCallum's letter is as follows:

Sir: I was much interested in your short article on "Albinism in Birds," which appeared in today's issue. I would like to ask Mr. R. Lucas, if his white robins should die, to examine the contents of their intestines to see if they contain tape worms.

For a number of years I have been observing birds, and during that time I have had a number of albinos. Among them I have had a shorelark, a red-winged blackbird, a robin, a mallard, an English sparrow, and several animals, among them a black

squirrel, a muskrat, a mink and a chipmunk. The last was about to become the mother of four little albinos. She was in cage, but one night a villainous cat (that pest of all bird and small animal life), unfortunately obtained access to the cage and at instant as it seemed, snatched my pet through the wires. However, she had her labor for her pains, and I was glad to know, also, her pains for her labor, for a well-directed blow caused her to drop her prey, but not before she had so injured my poor little albino that it died. An autopsy showed the condition I have described, and it also showed that there were tape worms in her intestines.

The same may be said of every instance that has fallen under my notice, and I shall be glad to know if other observers have noticed the same thing. If they have not looked for them, I trust that they will do so in any future case, which may fall under their notice, and report. Birds are very prone to have tape worms, and it may have been a coincidence in my cases, but it was so general that I suspect that the parasites have something to do with the lack of coloring matter in the blood.

Besides most of these albinos, I have in my collection a very good specimen of the opposite condition in a melanotic rough-legged hawk. I cannot say that I agree that melanism occurs more rarely than albinism, for the black squirrel is a melanotic phase of the gray squirrel, in which case in this country at least, the abnormal coloring is far more common than the normal.

SCHOOL TEACHERS CONVE
Sisters of St. Joseph From London District Met Last Week.

A convention of the Sisters of St. Joseph in charge of the Separate schools in Walkerville, Belle River, St. Thomas, Goderich, Ingersoll and London was held last week at the convent, Mount St. Joseph. The convention was ably conducted by Mr. J. F. Power, of the Simcoe Collegiate Institute. In his opening address Mr. Power complimented the teachers present on the remarkable success of the past year's work in the various departments of the school course. He was pleased to see the separate schools keeping abreast with the times in the mental, moral and physical training of youth. The special lectures were given to those teachers engaged in higher grades. The lectures on the various subjects were interesting and most practical, tending to show the fundamental principles underlying the science of education in its true sense. The lecturer dwelt on the necessity of presenting all new matter logically, thus developing the child's mind along natural lines.

The programme was presented with the aid of many illustrations from the daily experiences of the teachers.
