The weather has been generally fair and moderately cold today over the greater portion of Canada, except in the Northwest Territories, where it has been considerably colder.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Dawson, 34 below—12 below; Victoria, 40—48; Edmonton, 8 below—6; Calgary, 8—16; Qu'Appelle, 14—30; Winnipeg, 14—40; Port Arthur, 2—30; Parry Sound, 12—30; Toronto, 25—34; Montreal, 16—26; Quebec, 12—28; Halifax, 28—48.

Local temperatures—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Wednesday, March 5, were 36 and 20.

CLUB FORMED BY LOCAL ANGLERS
Improvement of Thames River Fishing Their Object.

The local knights of the rod, line and hook got together last night at the London House and organized "The Thames River Angling Association." Starting as it does with a membership of about sixty, the club's prospects for a successful existence are extremely bright. The need of such a club has long been felt. Previous clubs have been of a more exclusive and private character, but the constitution of the new organization provides for the admission to membership of all interested in the noble sport of angling. To judge by the size and the enthusiasm of last night's meeting, the new club is already assured of success.

The object of the club is to protect the rights of river rod-fishers, and the club's efforts will first be directed to the removal from the river of six or more seines and dip-nets between the mouth of the river and Cashmere dam.

Col. Leys' efforts to have the Cashmere dam removed were warmly approved of by the club, and he was given great credit for his agitation to clear the river of this obstruction. It was suggested that the farmers residing on the river front be invited to co-operate with the club in the protection of the river.

Mr. Hume Elliot, one of a deputation sent to Toronto, reported the reception of the delegation by Hon. F. R. Latchford, and his promise that he would consider their views and extend aid where possible.
