CALGARY WANTS NEXT ASSEMBLY

Toronto Would Also Like Big Meeting of Presbyterians in 1912.

OPINION OF THE WEST

Winnipeg Would Like to See the Assembly Next in Calgary—This Year at Ottawa.

The Winnipeg Tribune says: Calgary will be the mecca for the Presbyterian people of Canada in 1912. This is the opinion expressed by well-informed Winnipeg Presbyterians. In that year the great annual gathering of representatives of the denomination will probably be held in the western city. The choice of the place for assembly rests with the assembly itself, which will meet this year in Ottawa. Calgary has, however, already announced that it will issue a cordial invitation to the ministers and elders to turn their faces to the west in the summer of 1912, and it is believed here that the invitation will be accepted.

Calgary is financially able as well as willing to entertain the members of this distinguished body. Greater than the city of Ottawa, it is richer than Winnipeg when it first received the assembly in 1887. It has a large Presbyterian element in five churches. If the assembly itself meets here, the sessions will be held in Knox church, the mother church of the city so far as Presbyterianism goes, of which the Rev. J. A. Clark is the successful pastor.

Toronto Wants It.
Another Knox church that of the city of Toronto, will also probably issue an invitation to the assembly for the meeting of 1912. Toronto entertained the assembly at regular intervals in 1896, and it is said to be her turn this year. Knox Church, Ottawa, has, however, a new building, and it succeeded in 1910, at Halifax, in persuading the fathers to go to the capital for the gathering of this year. If Toronto should press its claims vigorously, the assembly of 1912, there would be a question with reference to the matter. Otherwise the meeting, for the first time in the history of the church, will be held in the province of Alberta, and the special trains with the ministers and elders will run across the continent to the foothills.

Will Be Historic.
The meeting of 1912 will be historic one, since at that assembly the question of church union between the Presbyterians, the Methodists and the Congregationalists, will without question be finally dealt with. During the interval between the assembly of 1911 and the assembly of 1912, the members of the church will vote on the question, and the assembly of 1912 will take action in accordance with the decision and judgment of the rank and file of the membership.

Journey to Ottawa.
Already a large number of Presbyterians who expect to be present at the opening of the assembly in Knox Church, Ottawa, on the evening of June 7, have left here for the west. The westerners, however, have gone to the west in the hope of securing a more favorable view of the union question. The main body of the western representatives will leave this city on Monday.

The arrangements for the trip are that all those attending the meeting pay full fare on the east-bound journey, and then, after the meeting, pay the balance of the fare on the return journey. A ticket for the return journey is issued free. There is never any question on this latter point, as the attendance is always large, and the fare in excess of the minimum mentioned. The travellers are permitted to spend four weeks in the east, and on the return journey an additional week. Fifteen days are allowed for the return journey, after leaving Ottawa. Almost all the western people who attend the assembly do so with the purpose of combining the business of the church with the pleasure of a visit to their former homes, or the cities of the east. Many of the wives and other relatives and friends of the commissioners accompany them each year to the assemblies.

Travelling Expenses.
One of the matters which will be brought up for earnest consideration and discussion at the meeting this year in Ottawa will be the proposal to pay either in part or in full of the travelling expenses of the commissioners. This is a subject which specially interests the men in the smaller congregations in the western provinces. The assembly is a constitutional body of ministers and elders from each of the presbyteries of the church, each presbytery electing representatives in proportion to its numerical strength. As a matter of fact, the west has practically never been represented in this court, the church at all, although it has been in the thirty-seven years of the existence of the Presbyterian Church, since the union of 1857, the general assembly has met but four times west of Lake Superior. In thirty-two years out of thirty-six, the meeting has been held in the east, and the west has been what is known as a "guest" in the east.

The gathering has been made up almost wholly of ministers and elders from the Province of Ontario. In 1910, at the meeting in Halifax, more than half of the presbyteries of Western Canada did not have a single minister or elder in attendance at the meeting. From the Province of Saskatchewan there were only three settlers, and from the Province of British Columbia there were none.

Western Delegates Handicapped.
This was by no means due to any indifference on the part of ministers in Western Canada. Every presbytery in the west made every effort to get its representatives to the meeting. The appointments were all made, but when the time came, the representatives from the west could not afford to make the journey. Part of the expense is at the present time provided for by the church, with the exception of entertainment at the place of meeting. All railway fares, etc., must be paid by the minister out of his own pocket. This is in spite of the fact that the east has not been required to face the long railway journey with the incidental expense, with the result that while only a small percentage of the ministers of the west attend the annual gathering, 50 per cent of the eastern men are able to do so. Such a state of affairs is a decided disadvantage to the west, and it is hoped that at the Ottawa meeting, and the following year, the matter will be fully represented at the meeting in 1912. A singular feature of this im-

provement consists in the fact that, although it has not yet been effected, it commands the support of most of the conservative financial men in the denomination.

Increase of Salaries.
Another matter which will be pressed most vigorously on the action of the assembly this year, and in which the ministry of the church is somewhat deeply interested, is a proposal to increase a considerable extent the salaries paid to ministers and students, who are in charge of the mission fields in the summer recesses. This subject was recently considered at a special meeting of a large committee of the assembly in Toronto. On this committee there were some of the ablest laymen of the denomination. At the gathering it was decided that the time had come when the principles of the church should be applied to the business affairs of the Presbyterian Church. The disapproval of the assembly in Toronto, on this subject, was declared, and it was decided that similar methods to those which are used in connection with foreign missions should be used in connection with the home mission. The church should be able to pay its ministers a check each month in full for their services from the head office of the church, and the salary should be paid by the head office. The business of the church would be brought to a more business-like practice of a good business house which recognized its obligations to its employees, and met these obligations promptly. The church, especially among the laymen of the denomination, is satisfied that, unless action is taken to relieve the ministers of the church of the financial difficulties which are compelled to bear, the results to the denomination in the future will be most disastrous.

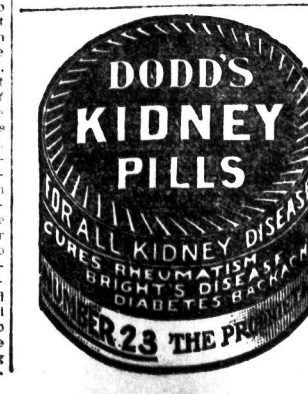
"Girl of Golden West" Produced at Covent Garden.

A corporation model is one of the benefits expected as the result of yesterday's decision. Financiers say that they have long been looking for a pattern after which to mold their combinations and they express satisfaction over the feature of the supreme court's decision which orders the reorganization of the tobacco corporation along legal lines under the supervision of the lower court. It was said in the financial district today that until this reorganization was worked out, it was unlikely that any new organization of magnitude would be accepted.
