BIG BOAT AT TORONTO

Queen City Soon to be Served With Ocean-Going Vessels.

Toronto, July 27.—Another indication that Toronto in the near future will be served with ocean-going vessels, was the arrival today of the new steel steamer Yorkton, of the Mathews Steamship Line, with Capt. J. Kavanagh in command. The Yorkton will be used in freight and passenger service on the great lakes between Montreal and Port William. The vessel was built at Sunderland, England, and it carried its first cargo when she brought a large consignment of scoria blocks from the old country.

The boat is designed after the same pattern as the vessel now in commission that call at Toronto, and has all modern equipments. The Yorkton is 257 feet long, beam 42.6, depth 18.6, and is double bottom, electric lighted, steam heated. The rudder is also controlled by steam. The vessel is 100 A1, which permits her carrying cargo for any part of the world. The Yorkton can make twelve miles an hour, and is driven by single screw engines, 17,284 hp by 33 stroke. Two boilers, natural draft, 12x11. The vessel left Montreal, Quebec, on July 7, and made the fastest trip across the Atlantic that any freight boat travelled, docking at Montreal, Quebec, and New Brunswick, in fifteen days. Holloway turned the boat over at Montreal to Capt. Kavanagh. The boat is at the city docks, Princess street, where a gang of stevedores are busy unloading the cargo.

TAKE STEPS TO MAKE OVER TOBACCO TRUST

"Re-Creation" in Harmony With Decision Under Way.

New York, July 27.—Steps towards "re-creating" the American Tobacco Company out of the elements now composing it, in harmony with the decision of the supreme court, was taken today when announcement was made of the formation of protective committees by holders of 6 per cent bonds, the 4 per cent bonds and the preferred stock.

The chairman of the 6 per cent bondholders' committee is Alexander Hamilton, president of the Guarantee Trust Company. His associates include Albert H. Wiggin, president of the Chase National Bank, and T. D. Cuyler, of Philadelphia.

The committee's notice refers to the decision of the American Tobacco Company to comply with the order of the supreme court and urge united action on the part of the bondholders.

Similar representations are made by the committee for the 4 per cent bonds, of which Charles H. Sobin, vice-president of the Guarantee Trust Company, is chairman, and the preferred stockholders' committee of which J. N. Wallace, president of the Central Trust Company, is chairman. The three committees join in requesting that certificates of bonds and stocks be deposited not later than Aug. 28 next.

It is understood that the protective committees were not formed until after the work of reorganizing the American Tobacco Company has been delegated by the higher tribunal.

LENGTHEN PERIOD OF CIRCULATION

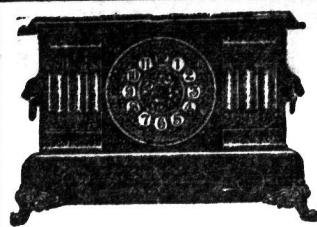
Banks to Ask Privilege During Time of Crop-Moving.

Montreal, July 27.—A movement is gathering strength in banking circles here to secure greater circulation during the period of crop moving, namely, the period in which the crops must be moved from the farms to the city.

Conservative bankers consider capitalization on which note circulation rests has been increased to the limit of the country's resources.

Therefore, it is to be attempted, and the government will, probably, shortly be asked to lengthen the period in which the banks are allowed to increase their note circulation by 25 per cent, to include the months of September and March, as well as October, November, December, January and February.
