demonstration of his treatment on that day in the Royal Hospital, Schlotheim confirmed the announcement.

Friedmann's statement was made at the opening yesterday of the eleventh international tuberculosis conference, under the patronage of the empress.

That no specific cure for the "white plague" has been discovered, but that the greatest progress had been made in fighting the disease, was the gist of the first day's discussion.

When the board of management and twelve permanent commissions met in the afternoon at the Reichstag building, their first act was to send a congratulatory message to Empress Augusta Victoria, who today celebrated her fifty-fifth birthday. Fifteen governments were represented in the conference. Eight hundred delegates were in attendance.

"Pussy Foot's Great Work" In Wild and Woolly West

Famous Outlaw Smasher of Oklahoma Tells of Thrilling Adventures—How the Bad Men Were Hunted Down.

"Pussy Foot," of Oklahoma, a famous "outlaw smasher" of the Western States, homeward bound from Milan, where he has been attending the international prohibition conference (of which he is a vice-president), was in London, England, recently, having a quiet look round after strenuous days of travel and hairbreadth escapes in the wild and woolly West.

He is Mr. W. E. Johnson, late chief officer of the Indian service for the American Government, and for five years he has had a breathless time amid the scum of humanity in his business of suppressing illegal drink-selling to the Red Indians throughout the United States.

The Hard Nuts at Work. "Pussy Foot" was christened by the bootleggers, cattle-raiders and murderers, because of his manner of hunting "boma desperados—As a cat stalks a mouse; and he told a few of his tales to a Daily News representative in Fleet street.

In 1906, he said, things had become pretty bad in the Indian Territory away west, and peace in that tract now known as the State of Oklahoma, where gangs of outlaws ran riot, sold illicit drink to the Red Indians, and held the place as soon as the "pizen" had soaked in. Washington gave him a free hand to run them down. He chose his own staff of "hard nuts" all and all handy with a gun.

"In the old Indian Territory where we first worked," he said, "there were only four courts and eight judges to tackle the whole law of the land, and when I got up there I found the lawless element of 6,000 cases already waiting trial."

"It had to be rough justice, I can assure you, and in a period of a little more than five years we ran down and convicted over 3,400 outlaws, less on the whiskey 'lay,' smashed to smithereens a little over half a million bottles of 'pizen,' and burned down 78 gambling houses.

Epidemic of Kidney Disease. "Whiskey" was sold under all sort of queer names—"moonshine," "honey cure," there was a tremendous lot of alleged kidney disease absolutely rampering for

life almost unbearable, and the swarms of large grass-cutting ants, which appeared at sunset, ate our clothing, made our mosquito nets useless, and even devoured our ropes.

Disease, too, was a very grave consideration, and during a certain portion of our journey our food supply gave out, and we were reduced to eating monkey flesh, and very little of that."

Dr. Hamilton Rice was himself attacked with poisonous ulcers and compelled to operate by candlelight by injecting cocaine and cutting his leg to the bone. The operation took two hours, and although this occurred nine months ago the wounds are still unhealed.

A Desperate Case. "One day early in the journey the wife of the chief Indian guide appeared, having been practically cut in half by an axe and I also had to operate on her for internal abscess. My terrified followers erected a rough operating table in the virgin forest, and I had to administer the chloroform and use the knife as well.

"It was not surprising that the patient died, and there in the primeval jungle the practically dying Indians erected a cross ten feet high. The majority of the operations, of which there were over a hundred, were successful."

SIMPLICITY IN FRANCE.

"After some weeks passed lately in one of the old and poorer aristocratic families in France, I am struck with the simplicity of the life led as compared with that of many of the same status and means in England. I mean that the happy and contented with less—less clothes, less in the way of table appointments, less plate, etc., and, consequently, with fewer servants. They appear, too, to have no desire or need for that general outpouring of books, ornaments, ticknacks, and the accumulation of things with which we, perhaps rather uselessly, surround ourselves, and which go to make what is to us 'home.' There is no room for such things in the house in my mind, and the need for them does not exist. The message is simplicity itself," says a "Middle-Class Englishwoman," in the Post.

MORE FIXITY.

The Rev. Henry N. Couden, the blind chaplain of the House of Representatives at Washington, had an idea some time ago that he would prefer to be chaplain of the senate, and went to see Speaker Cannon about it. "What do you want to go over there for?" stormed the Speaker. "The House is a flower garden and the Senate is a graveyard." White strawberries, and, we believe, white blackberries, are occasionally found growing wild—sports of nature somewhat akin to albinos in the human race.

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TEACHER-MOTHERS TO BE BANNED IN N. Y.

Only Two Out of Fifteen Now Hold Their Positions.

New York, October 22.—The status of the teacher-mother in New York public schools is still under consideration by the board of education, with the report current that ultimate dismissal of all teachers of this class in the aim of the board and members from a list of 15 teachers who had absented themselves from school to become mothers since Jan. 1 last, it was found that nine had already presented resignations, and only two of those named are now in schools.

The list, made up by the various district superintendents at the request of the board after the recent dismissal of Mrs. Bridget Palkotto because she became a mother, names Mrs. Helen L. Becker, wife of Charles Becker, the convict police lieutenant, as one woman who absented herself from school for maternal reasons. Her child did not live, and Mrs. Becker is one of the two teachers reinstated.

Horrors of Amazon Jungle

Surgeon's Operations in Primeval Forest—Dr. Rice's Thrilling Story of Adventure.

In conversation with Reuters' representative Dr. Hamilton Rice said that the objects of his expedition were to explore and map the greatest unknown area in the world, and also to pursue medical and anthropological studies. In spite of enormous difficulties and hardships, his journey had been successful. He had collected valuable scientific data, and had explored the geography of the Amazon and Orinoco systems.

In describing his journey, Dr. Hamilton Rice said: "Until August last, when we reached civilization at Manaus, a thousand miles up the Amazon River, our record was one of bad weather and physical horrors which only South America can supply, of insects which made existence horrible, of periods of starvation and consequent mutiny, and the constant presence of disease."

Poisonous Serpents. "On the Papunawa River we came across people who had never seen a white man. They suffered much from the bites of poisonous serpents, with which the river was infested, as a result of which a large number of Indians perished every year."
