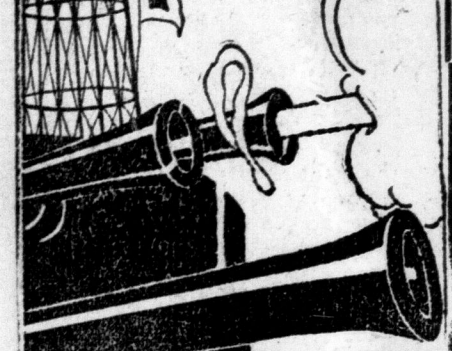

WARRANT ISSUED AGAINST DOCTOR

Detectives Have An Important Clue to the Tamworth Case.

BODY OF A BABY FOUND

Inquest Shows That Blanche Yorke Died as Result of Illegal Operation.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

TAMWORTH, July 29.—A warrant charging murder was issued tonight for Dr. C. T. Robinson, in whose home was found the body of Blanche Yorke, the pretty Tamworth dressmaker, whose disappearance on July 8 has aroused the entire province.

Moreover, it is believed that the missing physician will not remain long without the pale of the law. Detective Inspector Miller, who has been working on the case, left the village hurriedly at 10 o'clock this evening. Along with this comes a report that the machinery of the provincial police department has been moving rapidly within the last two days, and that the whereabouts of the young physician are known.

The Little Village of Clonmel has been the scene of one of the most harrowing crimes in the history of the province, was in mourning today. All the streets were closed and the blinds of the houses were drawn. There was no business done. Villagers gathered in small groups on the streets and conversed in whispers about the murder of "Happy" Blanche and of the finding of her hacked corpse in the small shed adjoining the home of the quiet and popular young physician, who has been practicing here since he left the hospital at Kingston, where he was house surgeon, and established for himself an excellent reputation.

Dead Babe Also Found.

With the removal today of the remains from their hastily-constructed hiding place, came another phase of the case which made the tragedy increasingly sad. Beside the body of the young woman was the corpse of a child, normal but prematurely born, and also several obstetric instruments.

Inquest Adjourned.

A coroner's jury, under the direction of Dr. Cowan, of Nanapanee, sat all this afternoon and evening hearing evidence in the case. Many witnesses were summoned, and it was necessary to adjourn the hearing until tomorrow morning for further evidence. Testimony was taken first for the purpose of establishing identity and then to learn the means by which the young woman met her untimely end.

The hall was crowded with people from the village and surrounding country, many of the latter having driven miles to be present.

Body Nude, With Legs Off.

The evidence showed that the corpse was found nude. The legs were severed below the knee and were found in the furnace badly burned. It was pointed out that in an effort to hide the body it had been sewn in a mattress and later buried in a hole which had seemingly been scooped out of the ground by hand. A number of suitable instruments, the spot being covered with wood to deceive any searchers.

Dr. W. T. Connell, pathologist at Queen's University, who performed the autopsy, stated that death was caused from hemorrhage due to an illegal operation. There were no external marks of violence.

The first witness called was Bruce Richardson, who told of a search of the premises, when it was necessary to place the furniture of Dr. Robinson in the hands of the bailiff. The place was in great disorder. This was corroborated by J. Taylor, furniture dealer. To Crown Attorney C. H. Preston this witness also stated that he had questioned Dr. Robinson about the disappearance of Miss Yorke, and the physician stated that he could not imagine what had become of her.

Dr. H. W. Wilson corroborated a report that Miss Yorke had called upon him with reference to her condition.

A Companion's Testimony.

Miss Agnes Walsh, daughter of Miss York, employed, told of walking with the dead girl toward Dr. Robinson's office on July 8. Blanche told her she was going to get some medicine, and would return. Another witness told of seeing Miss Yorke's body lying on a table in the physician's office on July 8 and the description tallied with that given by Miss Walsh.

Doctor Sailed on America.

KINGSTON, July 29.—The mother and sister of Dr. Robinson, who reside here, heard for the first time today of the tragedy with which the name of Dr. Robinson is connected. They said they did not know where the physician was.

Dr. Robinson is known to have been in Kingston on several occasions during the week of July 13, and to have gone on the steamer America on July 16 to Cape Vincent, N. Y. He was a house surgeon at Kingston Hospital in 1912.

NEW DUNDEE FIRE SWEEP LOSS WILL TOTAL \$25,000 WHOLE TOWN THREATENED

Flames Started In Millinery Department of Big General Store and Quickly Spread Through Frame Building.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

BERLIN, July 29.—Fire of unknown origin caused a loss of \$25,000, and the village of New Dundee tonight, and for time threatened to completely destroy the whole place, which is without fire protection.

The flames were first noticed shortly after 5 o'clock in the millinery department of Buck & Lautenschlager's store. They had made a headway, and it was not long before they were sweeping through the whole of the two-story frame block. From there they leaped to the Union Bank, and next the frame block owned by Charles Mayer was destroyed.

Calls for help were sent to Galt, Ayr and Hespeler. Not until 10 o'clock to-night was the fire checked.

No Fire Protection.

The village, being without fire protection, the flames soon made rapid headway on the old frame structures, and the adjoining buildings were in constant danger of destruction.

The fire departments from Ayr and Plattville arrived in an hour's time. The brigade, towed by a small roadster, hand-engine, pulled by a small roadster, and the Ayr department brought a steam engine with five relays of hose, and Water was pumped from the dam, and three streams checked the blaze from spreading.

Hespeler Started.

The Hespeler brigade also started on the road, but because of assistance, a volunteer bucket brigade fought the flames, and the valiant work of the fire-fighters and the assistance of the neighboring fire departments elicited the admiration of the hundreds of people, who came from many miles around.

The loss on the building and contents of Buck & Lautenschlager is \$17,000; \$12,000 of this stock and is partly covered by insurance.

The hotel loss is about \$7,000, with no insurance. The bank suffered a big loss in fixtures, and the books and papers were safely locked in the vault. Only a small part of the contents of the store and hotel was saved.

Entire Machinery of Russia Soon TO RAISE CORPS OF NURSES IN LONDON TO BE IN MOTION

Only a Miracle Can Prevent War, According to St. Petersburg.

WILL STAND BY SERBIA

Exchange of Views Proposed Before Hostilities Broke Out.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 29.—In Russian eyes the die is cast. Only a political miracle can avert war.

Russia does not sever from her determination to support Serbia, and partial mobilization has already been ordered. There is every indication that the whole vast military machinery of Russia will soon be set in motion.

An imperial manifesto is awaited tonight. Should, as it is understood, Emperor Nicholas become generalissimo of the forces, an immense wave of enthusiasm will sweep over Russia.

The political parties have sunk their differences. The general attitude is not "dilettante," but one of resolute confidence in the justice of the country's cause and readiness to make all sacrifices.

The proposal attributed to Austria to discuss terms when Belgrade has been occupied is regarded as impossible. It is pointed out that before the opening of hostilities, Russia proposed to Austria a direct exchange of views, which Austria rejected.

The foregoing St. Petersburg dispatch was passed by the censor without reservation, which is considered highly significant.

ENEMIES OF CZAR HOLD A MEETING IN OTTAWA CITY

Two Thousand Poles and Ukrainians Discuss Russian Tyranny.

OTTAWA, July 29.—Crying revenge against the "tyranny and oppression" of Russia, about two thousand Poles and Ukrainians, members of the revolutionary parties of these former principalities, held a mass meeting here tonight.

The Ukrainians formerly numbered about half the inhabitants of Russia, but are now scattered all over the world, about three hundred thousand living in Canada.

In view of the present imminence of war in Russia, the present meeting is exceptionally significant. Much enthusiasm was shown by the members present, and a furtherance of steps against the Czar and his ministers, should Russia enter the Austro-Serbian imbroglio, were discussed.

A \$200,000 CORPORATION IS BEING PROJECTED

Movement Toward Co-operation in All Electric Supply Companies.

TORONTO, July 29.—A movement has been put on foot by privately owned electric light and power companies to co-operate in the purchase of electrical equipment and supplies. These companies are members of the Canadian Electrical Association, of which the general office is in Toronto. The capital represented is over two hundred millions of dollars, and the various undertakings having membership in the association stretch across Canada from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

An office of the association was asked today if this move in co-operation was a stepping stone towards the formation of a vast combine, but he said nothing was further from their thoughts.

The Situation in Brief

Belgrade was bombarded with great damage. An artillery duel is in progress three and a half miles away.

Prayers were offered in the Kazan Cathedral, St. Petersburg, for victory to the Slav.

A slump in the raw silk market at Tokio resulted from the outbreak of war between Austria and Serbia, and the withdrawal of orders by Europeans. Several banks raised their exchange rates on London.

Financial and commercial business in Antwerp is paralyzed as the result of the Austro-Serbian situation. The stock exchange was closed yesterday. It is anticipated that the business with the United States will increase enormously if a general war should ensue.

Servians blew up the bridge connecting their capital with the Austrian town Semliu, and were driven back by Austrians, who captured two vessels.

Russia commenced mobilizing along the Austrian frontier.

Sir Edward Grey continued his efforts for a settlement.

The Vienna Bourse suspended all operations until further notice.

Bankers withdrawing their balances from Russia, Austria and Germany, and transferring them to London.

Price of St. Petersburg and Vienna bills drop to lowest of two decades.

A conference of German Cabinet held on the situation.

Depositors continued withdrawing money from savings banks.

German forces are likely to mobilize today.

The St. Petersburg Bourse was ordered closed for three days.

The British Government maintained the attitude that the crisis does not affect Britain. No measures were taken toward mobilization.

The Italian Government issued an order prohibiting the publication of the dispatch of all news concerning Italian military and naval movements.
