





Village Cast in Gloom. The little village which has been the scene of one of the most harrow-ing crimes in the history of the province, was in mourning today. All the stores were closed and the blinds of the houses were drawn. There was no business done. Villagers gathered in small groups on the streets and conversed in whispers about the murder of "Happy" Blanche and of the finding of her hacked corpse in the small shed adjoining the home of the quiet and popular young physician, who has been practicing here since he left the hospital at Kingston, where he was house surgeon, and established for nimself an excellent Wife of Assistant Secretary Only a Miracle Can Prevent

Dead Babe Also Found. With the removal today of the remains from their hastily-constructed hiding place, came another phase of the case which made the tragedy increasingly sad. Beside the body of the young woman was the corpse of a child, normal but prematurely born. and also several obstetric instruments.

Inquest Adjourned. A coroner's jury, under the direcion of Dr. Cowan, of Napanee, sat all this afternoon and evening hearing evidence in the case. corpse when found was nude. legs were severed below the knee and were found in the furnace badly burned. It was pointed out that in an effort to hide the body it had been sewn in a mattress and later buried, in a hole which had seemingly been scooped out of the ground by hand, in lieu of suitable instruments, the spot being covered with wood to deceive any searchers.

Death Due to Hemorrhage.

Dr. W. T. Connell, bacteriologist at Queen's University, who performed the autopsy, stated that death was caused from hemorrhage due to an illegal operation. There were no external marks of violence.

The first witness called was Bruce Richardson, who told of a search of the premises, when it was necessary to place the furniture of Dr. Robinson in the hands of the bailiff. The place was in great disorder. This was corobor ated by J. Taylor, furniture dealer. To Crown Attorney C. H. Preston this witness also stated that he had questioned Dr. Robinson about the disappearance of Miss Yorke, and the phy sician stated that he could not imagine what had become of her.


