HOTELMEN MAKING**NO CHANGE NOW IN LIQUOR AGREEMENT**

Decide To Stand by Rules For Evening Trade.

ONLY THREE OPPOSE IT

Others Favor Only Malt Beverages After 5 o'Clock Standard Time.

No chance whatever will be made by the hotelkeepers as to the hours for the sale of spirituous liquors and the present practice, adopted eight weeks ago, of selling only beer, ale and porter after 5 o'clock, will remain effective, as long as the hotels have licenses. After the departure of the larger portion of soldiers at the military camp agitation to again revert to the old way of selling the "hard stuff" as long as the bars remained open.

At a meeting of the hotelmen two weeks ago it was thought that it might be wise to send a deputation to Col. L. W. Shannon, D. O. C., and interview him regarding his views on the contemplated change.

A canvass of the hotelmen of the city by a committee appointed for that purpose found only three hotelmen who wanted to go back to the sale of the spirituous liquors. With this information the hotelmen at a second meeting decided definitely to stand by their original agreement made with Col. Shannon not to sell liquor to soldiers or civilians after 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

"We have found the present system so much more satisfactory, and no trouble whatever, that we are going to stand by our agreement, and no hard liquor will again be sold in any London hotel bar after 5 o'clock," said one hotelman who before the recent innovation became effective had strenuously objected to giving up what he considered the most profitable part of the bar trade.

The beer, ale and porter sales after 5 o'clock have been in excess of that of other summers, but the percentage of drunkenness has decreased to such an extent that the hotelmen decided not to ask for the change again to the original hours.

LONDON ENGINE SUPPLIES**WINS CASE AT OSGOOD**

Action Brought by Prest-o-Light Company of New York Dismissed.

TORONTO, July 20.—The action brought by Prest-o-Light Company, Limited, of London, Ont., has been dismissed by Chief Justice Sir Glenholme Falconbridge. The plaintiff's business is the sale of acetylene gas in packages. They complained that their packages had been used by the defendant and refilled, so that the London company's customers thought they were getting plaintiff's gas.

CAR SHOPS EMPLOYEES**FAVOR STANDARD TIME**

Take Exception to Report at Trades and Labor Council Meeting.

Employees of the Grand Trunk car shops state that a report made at the last meeting of the trades and labor council that the car men are in favor of daylight saving is entirely incorrect as far as the G. T. R. shops is concerned. When petitions were circulated recently, only about 20 men out of 450 employed at the shops, wished to continue under the daylight saving blylaw, while those against it were most emphatically in favor of a change being made at once.

NEAR DROWNINGS AT PORT STANLEY RAISE GREAT EXCITEMENT

Boy and Ingersoll Girl Both in Danger.

TWO GALLANT RESCUES

Boys Play Big Part in Saving the Girl From Death.

PORT STANLEY, July 20.—What might have been two drowning fatalities caused a great deal of excitement and were the foundation for a number of wild rumors at Port Stanley today.

Walter Williamson, a village boy of five or six years, followed the example of another boy much older, who was diving, and dove into water over his head. He took the dive all right, but could not swim a stroke. He went down twice, but was rescued by a boarder at his home, who was swimming at the time.

The little lad was unconscious when brought to shore. Dr. Jackson of Union, was summoned, and the boy was restored, and removed to his home.

A young lady of the Ingersoll excursionists, with a party of friends, went in bathing in front of the Casino. A gentleman companion who could swim, swam out to the end of the Ada May Boat landing stage, where the launch had dredged a hole ten feet in depth. He swam over the hole and landed at the far side of it, where he could stand on bottom. He called to the young lady to join him. She endeavored to do so, but waded into the hole. In the meantime the young man had turned his attention elsewhere. Some small boys saw the lady sink and made for the place. Five or six of them kept her up till assistance came from adult swimmers. The girl suffered from shock.

FOSTER PARENTS ALL PLEASED WITH WARDS

Reports of Government Inspectors Show Highly Satisfactory Conditions.

Reports of the government inspectors who have recently visited in their foster homes, some 50 of the wards of the London and Middlesex Children's Aid Society, "Treatment Good; good of the value of the work being accomplished on behalf of neglected, dependent and sometimes delinquent children by this organization."

The following are extracts from these official reports, taken at random:

Boy of 2, pretty little boy, good health and happy in his home. His conduct is natural. Under the heading "Treatment" has been written: "He is the idol of the home, splendidly cared for. Foster-parents are delighted with the boy, and think he has no equal. He has everything required in the way of clothing. Character of the home: Good, happy, fine people."

Here is the tale told about a girl of 8: Good health, lively as a cricket, and happy as a sunflower. Conduct entirely satisfactory, and rather talkative. Very fond of animals. "Treatment: Good; goes to school regularly and is learning fast; well supplied with clothes. Character of the home: Good farm home, buildings and everything of the best."

Next to be picked up was the report on a girl 16 years of age, and her endorsement: "The Government Inspector says: 'Her health is the best and she is happy in her home. Her foster-mother says no better girl could be found. She is developing into a fine-looking woman.'"

To balance things up, a report was selected on a boy adopted a number of years ago, and now grown into young manhood, but still under the paternal supervision of the Children's Aid Society. The boy is now 19, has passed through the high school, and his foster-parents are now considering the advisability of a university course for their well-loved foster-son.

What do the wards themselves think of their foster-homes? There was a certain small boy who was considered incorrigible. He wouldn't go to school, and he wouldn't do much of anything, but got into mischief. Finally, through the wisdom and tact of the Children's Aid Society, he was placed in the very environment, where his best qualities might develop and his mischievous slough off or die for lack of exercise. He has so many real live interests out on a farm, he hasn't time to be thinking up mischief.

Master Jim has written as follows to Inspector Sanders: "I like it on the farm, and we got a lot of pigs and calves, and we got two bulls, and we got two ducks and chickens and hens, and we got two colts named Iron and King, and I like it out here. Mrs. R. will write after while. Yours truly,

"P. S.—I go to school every day. The teacher's name is — I like the teacher."

The comment of Mr. Sanders on the postscript was: "And to think that boy believed he was to go to school before!"

SALVATION ARMY**SAYS FAREWELL TO COL. GASKIN**

Local Corps and Division Holds Final Service.

GOING TO SWISS POST

Officer Who Has Been Secretary of Territory for 20 Years Says Good-Bye.

After holding the position for the past twenty years of chief secretary for the Salvation Army of this territory, with headquarters in Toronto, Col. Albert Gaskin last evening bade farewell to the soldiers of the London division in the No. 1 Citadel, Clarence street, previous to leaving in the near future for Europe, where he has been appointed chief secretary for Switzerland and Italy.

Accompanied by Mrs. Gaskin, who herself was a sergeant-major of her own corps before she was twenty, the colonel is leaving Canada early in August and will be succeeded in the secretaryship by Col. John McMillan, who, as a boy, attended school in London when his father was stationed at No. 1 Citadel. Over twenty years ago he went to Australia.

At the close of the twenty years of Col. Gaskin's service to the Army in this territory, there are now as many Salvationists in khaki as there were altogether when he entered upon the duties of the office.

During the course of his address, he referred to the fact that twenty years ago, the territory to which he was appointed was divided into a whole of Canada and a large portion of the United States. Subsequently, the American portion with 125 corps was separated, and again, a year ago, Western Canada was divided from Eastern, owing to the growing difficulties of administration resulting from the development of the work.

With all the reduction of territory, the supplying of some 250 other countries, and the transferring of members of the army to other places, this territory, now known as Eastern Canada, has quadrupled in numbers.

Twenty years ago, the property of the army was valued at \$750,000, "a large sum in itself, but not so very much when you consider how it was spread," said the colonel. Now, the army holds property valued at over \$4,000,000.

No Flag Flapping.

Concerning the borrowing power of the army, the colonel had this to say: "The integrity of the Salvation Army is the best security that can be offered. Only a short time ago, a gentleman said he had \$50,000 he could lend the army on time. And there aren't many people offering to lend \$50,000 any place in war time. One thing which has been real reason to be grateful for, and to be proud of, is the fact that we have never had property sold over our heads. Sometimes, our funds have been as low as \$2.54 in the headquarters treasury, but we carry on the work with 200 corps and upwards of 1,000 officers. But our officers are the kind that didn't stick to the money. There have been officers who have been driven out of their families, met the world unflinchingly, and did it on wages you wouldn't pay a girl. We have had brigadiers thankful to receive \$3 a week, who in any other walk in life could earn \$50 a week, or \$4,000 a year. And they haven't taken the public into their confidence about what was going on behind the scenes. They haven't flapped flags over their sacrifices."

Referring to the approaching departure from Canada, the colonel declared he thought it right to go while he and Mrs. Gaskin were still wanted in Canada. "I have seen officers who stayed a year or so too long. I feel that the verse is our own. 'And he led them forth in the right way.'"

Messages of greeting and welcome were conveyed from Mrs. Gaskin with special remembrance for the women of the League of Mercy.

German Swiss For Allies.

Concerning the fastest word ever referred to the situation of Switzerland, surrounded on all sides by nations engaged in war. His fears in regard to a possible reception for officers from Canada had been allayed by the ring of sympathy even on the part of the German Swiss expressed for the Allies. He anticipated pleasant associations in Switzerland, splendidly organized, and ranking very high educationally from a Salvation Army standpoint. The corps considered one of the best in the world is located at Basle, almost touching the French and German frontiers.

Briefly, hardships of the early days of his duties at headquarters in this territory were touched upon, days when the Salvation Army was not held in the respect of today, and instances were told of disturbance of meetings and orders from officials to "move on and not obstruct the streets."

Immediately after the address, the meeting was brought to a close with the singing of "God Be With You Till We Meet Again."

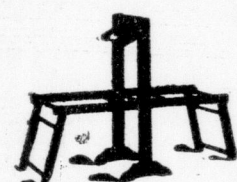
Many Officers Present.
