

TORONTO, July 20.—The action ought by Prest-o-Lite Company, Limted, of London, Ont., has been disnissed by Chief Justice Sir Glenholme Falconbridge. The plaintiff's business is the sale of acetylene gas in packages. They complained that their packages had been used by the defendant and refilled, so that the London company's customers thought they were

getting plaintiff's gas. Chief Justice Falconbridge points out that the purchasers of the plaintiffs' packages buy them out and out, and can do what they like with them so long as they do not represent they are filled with gas manufactured by the plaintiffs. It is held that the defendants took all reasonable precautions to notify the public that the tanks were charged with gas other than that of


