Two Foreign Attaches In Paris Seek Suicide As Way Out

PARIS, May 1.-Two foreign diplomatic attaches in Paris yesterday sought suicide as a means to end their troubles. One of them succeeded in killing himself, and the life of the other is de-spaired of. Worry over personal affairs is said to have been the motive in both cases. Meiczylaw Pochenow, an attache of the Polish legation. shot and killed himself in the Champs Elysees, while a short distance away Guillermo Erazurdi junior secretary to the Chilean legation, fired a bullet from a revolver into his temple. Erazurdi was removed to hospital in a precarious condition.
