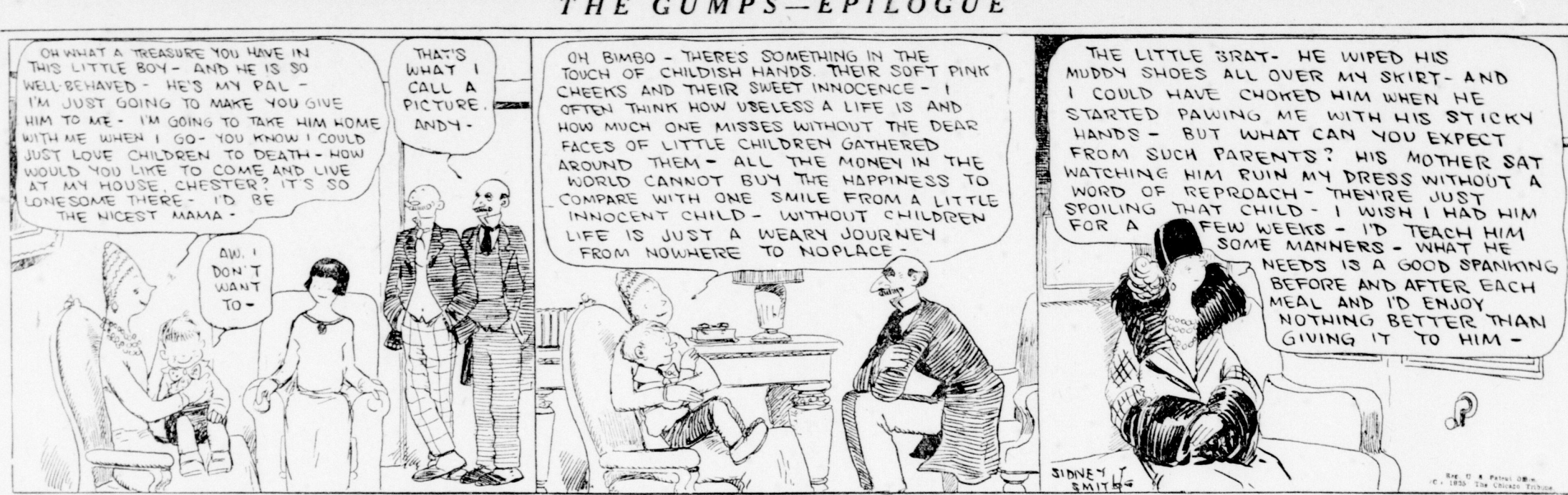

W.C.T.U. IS URGED TO START FIGHT TO BANISH CIGARETTES

Women of United States Are Now Waging Battle Against Tobacco.

EVANGELIST SPEAKS

Toronto, Jan. 15.—"Be more careful in the future than you were in the past to stand by those who have stood by you," was the advice given to prohibitionists by Sir George Foster who tonight addressed the evening session here of the National convention of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of Canada. "I want that to sink into your minds," he said. "It is not only bad manners and bad companionship, but bad policy for you to lose by it every time."

Mrs. Victoria Booth-Clifford Demarest, granddaughter of the late General William Booth of the Salvation Army, and Mrs. John Scott of Montreal, W.C.T.U. national superintendent, also addressed the meeting which was well attended. Mrs. Gordon Wright of London, dominion president, occupied the chair.

Sir George further advised his

hearers not to relax their efforts because they had apparently obtained their objective, but to realize that it was more important now than ever before for them to "carry on." Because a law was on the statutes it did not follow that it would be observed and nowhere was this more the case at the present time than in the United States and Canada. He recalled a recent gathering of a thousand leading businessmen of the United States, including John D. Rockefeller, Jun., who had launched a nationwide campaign not only to promote law observance, but also law enforcement. In this they had been promised the whole-hearted cooperation of President Coolidge, and the speaker regretted that Canada did not possess such men at the head of affairs here. The difficulty was that many of those who expressed themselves as sympathetic to law enforcement were not very strict in observing the law themselves.

The W. C. T. U. in Canada, Sir George said, had before them a chance to follow the lead set in the United States, and not only launch a campaign for law observance, but also law enforcement. He strongly advocated the use of radio in furthering such a campaign.

The world-wide evangelist, Mrs. Victoria Booth-Clifford Demarest, now conducting a series of revival meetings in Toronto, and who had just recently completed a speaking tour of the United States, declared that the W. C. T. U. in that country had been given full credit for having brought prohibition to that country. She said that the W. C. T. U. there were now launching a national campaign against the cigarette, and she hoped the organization in Canada would also enter a fight to banish it here.

Mrs. John Scott of Montreal pointed out that it was less than 100 years ago when slavery was not only condoned in Canada, but was also upheld from high pulpits, while at the present time an advocate of slavery would not be found. She predicted that in less than 100 years an advocate of moderate drinking would be equally as scarce.

SHIPS' CREW LOST.

Toronto, Jan. 15.—The summary issued by church union headquarters of results received up to 10 o'clock tonight showed 680 congregations voting for church union and 157 against.

On the other hand the Presbyterian church association report 162 congregations have voted to stay out of the union, as well as two missions. The congregations voting non-concurrence by provinces are:
Ontario 118, Quebec 9, Nova Scotia and Cape Breton 15, Prince Edward Island 2, Saskatchewan 7, Alberta 7, British Columbia 2.

The two missions are in Ontario. The total vote.
The summary of ballots cast in Canada on the church union question, to date is:
Ballots 80,304
For union 43,554
Against union 36,750
Majority for union, 6,804.
In addition, the joint committee for union reports that 491 congregations have entered the United church without taking a vote, so that their membership is not included in the above figures.

55. The vote was 211 to 156.
Rev. G. B. Paton, pastor of the church, is a strong unionist. It is not known what course he will pursue as the result of the vote. A meeting of the unionists to discuss the situation was held last night.
