# WILLIAM CHAPMAN HEADS THRESHERS

Lien Act Boosted at Morning Session of Convention Here.

William Chapman of Denfield was elected president of the Ontario brotherhood of threshermen at this morning's session in Ulster hall for the third consecutive term. E. S. Downe of Shedden was elected vicepresident, and Birrell Harris, secre-

tary-treasurer. The legislative committee of the association was instructed to take the necessary measures to have a lien act applicable to threshermen in Ontario put on the statute books. There was a good deal of discussion on this point, but the large majority of those present were strongly in of the introduction of such legisla tion. Several threshermen instanced cases where they had incurred serious financial loss owing to refusal o inability to pay on the part of their customers for threshing done, and declared themselves heartily of the proposal. It is hoped that this legislation may be obtained and made active in time to become operative for this year's threshing in Ontario Sam Oakes of Strathroy proved stalwart in opposing the measu maintaining that by careful consideration of all farmers in a neighbor hood the bad payers could be elimi nated from the places at which a thresher would consent to work. The opinion of the meeting in general. however, was that the lien law would provide a much-needed weapon in the hands of the threshermen in the case of bad payers.

A hint of politics was dropped into the meeting when Mr. Oakes, who has a record of 46 years of threshing in Ontario, declared that the tariff was largely to blame for the difficulties of the thresher, who was forced to buy high-priced manufactured articles nd to sell his services to a man who was in a similar position. He con-ended that free trade would be an aqualified boon to the farmers and
