MAY 1887, 26 YEARS AGO.

The 26th was almost cold; overcoats were worn.

JUNE 1887, 26 YEARS AGO.

Fine growing weather.

On the 16th the thermometer reached 85 degrees.

The 24th was cool, seen some people wear overcoats.

Prof. Campbell, Phrenologist, spoke in the Town Hall, on health; he also does quite a business feeling people's heads and selling electrical batteries.

Camp Meetings started in Mr. S. B. Schneider's Grove on the 15th; good attendance, great crowds on Sundays.

The papers say that the Constable of Heespeker, Mr. Henry Winterhalt, and another man helping him, caught

the notorious horse-thief and lodged him in Berlin jail, he being a dread to the farmers of Waterloo County, for some years. The authorities here offered a letter which he, John Kreuger, alias "Charles Storms" wrote which was a means of revealing the nefarious business carried on by him. On the 29th Messrs.
