

MINING IN KOOTENAY.

Season now Opening Promises to Surpass the Record in Activity.

Recent Buys by English and Canadian Capital—A Million Dollar Company Closed Out.

(From the Rossland Miner.)

With the disappearing snow there comes an increased activity all along the mining line, and the outlook is that there will be more activity in mining circles than has been the case for years. Prospects are beginning to get out into the hills for the purpose of doing assessment work and to find new ground to stake. There will be more prospectors in the field than ever this year. A few Kootenay prospectors have been talking of going into the Colville reservation in Washington to operate, but have been deterred from doing so by the war talk. They seem to think that it will be difficult to sell a claim there in the war, but on this side of the line it will be different.

Operations, it is expected, will be commenced this week on the Gertrude, on the southeast slope of Red Mountain in the Gertrude company, which owns the property, was it will be remembered, acquired a few days ago by the Montreal Red Mountain Gold and Silver Syndicate, which also owns the Coxy. Under the present development will be undertaken, but it is expected that eventually a subsidiary company will be organized to operate the Gertrude. R. G. Edwards, a brother of J. Edwards, Leckie of the Velvet, has been appointed superintendent of both the Coxy and the Gertrude, and he has arrived in the city to take charge of the two properties.

After negotiations extending over a period of several months the negotiations for the sale of the Lily May have been completed, and the property has been put under option to an English syndicate recently formed in London by Will R. White, late of Seattle. An initial payment has already been made. The price agreed upon includes a cash payment of \$250,000 and 10 per cent. of the stock in the English concern, which will have a capitalization of \$400,000. This will make the sale of the Lily May on the basis of \$250,000. The option will expire June 1, and the Lily May company will have a meeting in Spokane on May 6, and on May 7, to authorize the sale of the property.

Property of the Fourteen Consolidated Gold Mines, owning a group of properties in the South, in which Mr. White is heavily interested, will probably be purchased by the new concern. A meeting of the Fourteen Consolidated company has been called for April 30 to consider such a proposition.

Another meteoric mining company came to the end of its career when the sickening tuck yesterday, when the entire assets of the Rossland & Trail Gold Mining company were sold at auction by Sheriff Robinson to satisfy judgments of \$885.27 that had accumulated against the concern. The property included the Emma C. mine, and 10 per cent. of the Silver and the Southampton, all located on Lookout mountain, near Trail Creek.

The first bid made for the group was \$50, and from that price the property was slowly raised until Wilson McKinnon offered \$80, when the half seemed to be reached, and the entire lot was sold to him for that figure. The company was the regulation \$1,000,000 concern, and during the boom last year it managed to sell considerable stock. About \$3,000 worth of work was done, but when the collapse came the company was unable to dispose of enough stock to keep operations going, and it ran into debt. Judgments aggregating \$885.27 were obtained against the concern and in pursuance of the order of the court the group was sold by the sheriff yesterday. As the claims were the only assets of the concern, the sale deprives the company of its only property, and shareholders are in the unfortunate position of finding their stock worthless.

S. Thornton Langley has bonded the Solo and Crib claims on Wild Horse creek, six miles from Rossland. These properties have a splendid showing on the surface and are located six miles from a vein in a mineral belt of great promise. They adjoin the Black Cock, which it will be remembered, was bonded some time since to the Hall Mines for \$75,000. The bond that was taken on the Solo and Crib claims provides that \$25,000 worth of development work shall be done, and the owners are to receive one of the shares of the capital stock of the company that is to be formed by an English syndicate to operate them.

A. J. McMillan, who was in London on mining business connected with the placing of Rossland properties in the English market, is on his way back to Rossland and expects to be in the city in a few days. Mr. McMillan has handled a number of properties while away, notably the Mascot fraction, the Michigami, the Wolf, the Drake, the Albert and the Nelson, all on the east slope of Columbia & Kootenay mountain. He is interested in the British Columbia (Rossland and Slocan) syndicate.

It is reported that gold has been discovered in paying quantities on the beach at Kuskonok townsite. Twenty men are at work on the claim to discover whether it is float or a ledge. An assay is said to have given \$10 per ton in gold and eight ounces in silver. The ton of ore from the Last Chance mine near Kuskonok that was run through the Kasko Sampling works, gave returns of \$2 in gold, 92½ ounces of silver and 20 per cent. lead.

Edward Watts returned to Kaslo last week from Ottawa, where he spent the winter. He will start work on the Eagle as soon as spring opens, and in the meantime will look after his various mining interests.

THE BOUNDARY COUNTRY.

On the Broncho, a claim situated about three miles from Midway on the reservation, and owned by Geo. Cook and C. Warmoth, some extended work has been struck during the past week. The ore is quartz, carrying copper and gold. Preparations are being made for work on the Sunset in Deadwood camp, are being pushed forward as rapidly as possible. A force of men is now at work on the cabins, bunkers are being made, and the kitchen is being got ready for occupation. It is expected development work will be commenced in about a week or ten days. J. H. McFarlane, the superintendent, will move up to the claim this week.

The force on the Norfolk, in Central camp has been increased. In all about \$1,500 has been expended in development work on this claim, consisting of five shafts, running in depth from 20 to 50 feet, and considerable open work. The work now being carried on is under the supervision of James Arnold, one of the pioneer prospectors of this

district, and the original locator of many of the best claims in Boundary district. Joseph Manley, of Grand Forks, purchased last week of Wilson Lucian, a one-third interest in the Columbia, White Rose and Arrival mineral claims, in the Pass Creek district.

EAST KOOTENAY.

The representative of the English syndicate which has arranged the purchase of the Robert E. Burns claim has gone to London to raise the necessary capital to work the property and enlarge the mill.

The directors of the Bald Mountain Mining company were to have held a meeting this week to consider what steps they will take during the coming season. They have had a proposal to purchase from an American syndicate, and they will either dispose of the property or go on with work themselves with a view to doing further development and putting in machinery.

At a meeting of the directors of the Magic Placer Mining company last week it was decided that operations should begin as soon as possible, and that the necessary funds having been allowed, the sale of additional shares to the present shareholders, who have unbounded confidence in the success of the enterprise. Inquiries have been received from Eastern capitalists as to the possibility of a deal for the property.

The following companies are actively engaged on Wild Horse creek: The Invicta Gold Mining company; the Nip & Tuck company; the International Placer Mining company; Brewer Creek Placer company; Jennings & Pollock; McMillan & Co., and three Chinese companies.

Last week Messrs. Hayes, McGowan and Guldson of Fort Steele sold to J. A. Harvey and J. S. Borge, agents for a large Chicago syndicate, the Lake View, Last Chance, Bijou, Accidental, Uberta, Red Dee, Kootenay Star, Union Star, Denton, Royal Oak and Prudent claims. These claims are situated on Lake Moyle and form part of what is called the St. Eugene group of mines. They were all located during the summer of 1897. The consideration is recorded at \$1, but it is an open secret that it is away up in the thousands. The property is a silver-lead proposition and has a considerable showing of ore. It is expected that extensive operations will be commenced on the property at once.

NELSON DIVISION.

A fine chute of ore has just been struck on the Rainy Day No. 1 and No. 2 claims, in the Salmon river country, owned by the Salmon River & Forepine Mining company.

Work is to be resumed on the Tennessee, in the Salmon river country, where there has been considerable development. Three feet of ore, assaying on an average \$221 in gold, has been struck on the Flossie R. in the Salmon river country. The shaft was sunk only five feet when the chute was exposed.

The Wilcox & Rumens company is pushing development work on the Bulion, situated about one mile up Quartz creek. This property was purchased by the Air company last fall from B. H. Lloyd.

Work will be resumed on the Wilcox & Rumens claim. This property is owned by the Canadian Pacific Gold Fields company, and they have done considerable development work on the property. The district was closed down about the first of the year on account of the snow.

REVELSTOCK AND TROUT LAKE.

With the opening of spring development has commenced already on several claims. Among others a party of men has started to reopen work on the Commonwealth group up the North Fork, which belongs to the Commonwealth company of Brandon.

Wilcox & Rumens, who have been all winter working the Carbonate Chief claim, on Keystone mountain, have done over 200 feet of work, tunnel and cross cut, and are highly pleased with the results. Their crosscut on the lead is 60 feet and they have not yet got the width of the ledge. Every one thought this ledge—the Carbonate Chief—was of great size. The Carbonate Chief has two claims west of Abrahamson's Snowbird—to be of great size by the capping, and Wilcox & Rumens' work proves it to be so. There is a most promising prospect on the Keystone mountain and it will yet rank with the best camps in the country if it gets transportation facilities.

SLOCAN DIVISION.

The Wakefield Mines, limited, has been authorized to raise a capital of \$100,000, in £1 shares. The object of the concern is to adopt an agreement with the English syndicate, and to acquire the assets and undertaking of the West Kootenay Exploring and Mining company, limited, and to carry on the business of a mining and prospecting company in the Slocan, in the Slocan, is the seat of operations, with Silverton as the headquarters.

Five inches of clean ore was struck on the Argo. W. W. Warner recently took a two-years' lease on the property, and, though little or no success was met with on the property by the Argo company, Mr. Warner found ore at the first attempt.

A. J. McMillan, manager of the British Columbia Mineral Properties, limited, reports that work is being pushed on the Silver Tip and Bear's Nest properties under his direction. A force of men are prospecting for the ledge which they expect to strike after going about 50 feet. They report a most promising formation, and are making progress rather slowly at present.

W. C. Cook, Fielding Phillips and Eugene Phillips have ceased operations on the Kallispell mine and will put in the season doing assessment work and prospecting. A recent shipment of ore from the property to the Nelson smelter gave runs amounting to \$13.50. They consider it to be among one of the best low grade properties in the country.

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

Motion to Restrict Mining Rights to Britishers Beyond Authority of Private Members.

Lieutenant Governor Attends to Assent to Grand Forks and Elections Bills.

TUESDAY, April 19.

The members of the local legislature had no business of special importance before them to-day, and spent a comparatively uneventful afternoon in the disposal of routine business. The Speaker took the chair at 2 o'clock, and the majority of the time thereafter until the adjournment was devoted to the consideration in committee of the Truck act (Mr. Kellie), although during the day His Honor attended to formally assent to the Grand Forks Enabling bill Western Railway Company bill and Provincial Elections bill.

COLUMBIA AND WESTERN.

Hon. Mr. Eberts moved the second reading of the Columbia & Western Subsidy Amendment bill, which explained that the scope of the measure was simply to allow further time to the railway company in which to make their selection of the route. The specified period had about expired, and an extension of nine months was desired.

Mr. Williams inquired why a reserve had been placed on the land in March, 1896, when the company had not filed the necessary plan until October of the same year. He questioned the authority of the government to reserve the land prior to the filing of the plan referred to.

The second reading was carried, and the bill was then advanced to its third reading and finally passed.

THE DAIRYING ACT.

By consent of the house, Hon. Mr. Turner introduced a bill to amend the Dairying act in some unimportant particulars, the measure in question being given a first reading.

ALIENS AND MINING RIGHTS.

Mr. Braden moved as an instruction to the mining committee in the consideration of section 3, chapter 135 of the Revised Statutes, to repeal section 3 of the Oaths act, 1897, and enact the following in lieu:

"3. Every person over eighteen years of age, and being a British subject, or an alien, upon his making a declaration of his intention to become a British subject before any person authorized to take affidavits or affirmations under the Oaths act, 1897, or before the gold commissioner or mining recorder, whose declaration shall be in the form U in the schedule to this act, and upon his filing the same with the mining recorder, and every joint stock company, shall be entitled to all the privileges of a free miner, and shall be considered a free miner, upon taking out a free miner's certificate. A minor who shall become a free miner shall, as regards his mining property and liabilities, be treated as a free miner. A free miner's certificate is issued in the name of the company, and is issued in its corporate name. A free miner's certificate shall not be transferable."

A point of order was raised by Mr. Smith, who maintained that a private member had no right to introduce an amendment of such character as it affected the revenue of the province.

Mr. Graham said that Mr. Braden's construction was essentially different from the intention of the committee, as the recommendations of the committee would not prevent aliens taking out free miner's licenses, and did not therefore interfere with the revenue. Mr. Kennedy also took this stand, referring to the minutes of the mining committee to show that Mr. Braden's instruction to the committee was to amend the Oaths act, 1897, and not to introduce a new act.

The motion was finally declared out of order, the Speaker citing two reasons: "His instruction: that it was not the proper form of instruction; and that it contained evidence of interference with taxation."

On consideration of the report on Bill No. 9 to incorporate the Kootenay & Western Railway Company, Mr. Hunter moved to strike out section 45 and insert in lieu thereof an amendment, to which Mr. Semlin offered some amendments. These were accepted and the report adopted as follows:

"The company shall commence section one within two years and complete said section within three years, and complete section two within four years, and complete the line of railway within six years from the date of the passing of this act. Nevertheless, failure to complete the line of railway within the time so limited for the completion of the same respectively, shall not prevent the company from exercising the rights of the company in respect of such part or parts (if any) of the sections as to which such failure shall be made as shall, at the expiration of such limited time, be made and completed, or in respect of any section or sections as to which the period so limited for the completion thereof shall not have been determined."

The Portland and Stikine Railway company bill was read a third time and passed.

BILLS ASSENTED.

The Lieutenant Governor then entered and gave his assent to the following bills: Grand Forks Enabling bill, Provincial Election bill, and Western Railway Company bill.

The report on the East Kootenay Valley Railway bill was adopted.

The government refused consent to go into committee on the second reading of the British Columbia Metalliferous Mines bill, and it was dropped.

The house then went into committee to consider the Truck act, Mr. Huff in the chair. All the clauses down to 10 were passed with the exception of 3, which was laid over. The committee rose at 5:35 and reported progress. The hearing that public works were going on at the time of the adjournment, and are now working at good speed on the bridge.

Hon. Col. Prior being called upon for a few remarks, said he did not think there was much occasion for a speech at the question before the meeting, especially in this respect. The fact that the matter had been taken up by the mayor and committee was sufficient to insure success. The celebration of the city enjoyed a season of prosperity, and no doubt a liberality would be shown when subscriptions towards the expenses were called for. He did not believe that the merchants of the city should be called upon to do it all. This was the idea which seemed to be held in the city, but it was a mistake. The large amount would be better raised by small contributions from a large number of people than by large subscriptions from a small number of people.

The secretary announced that there was a balance of \$53 standing over from last year. The mayor said this might be used for the celebration this year without a motion to that effect.

The secretary will at once notify the members of the general committee of their appointment and call a meeting for next Tuesday evening.
