MATAPEDIA BOY DIED OF WOUNDS

Was Twice Wounded Before Receiving Fatal Wound—A Brother in Service

It was officially announced some time ago of the death of Pte. Hudson A. Harvey of Matapedia, P. Q. who enlisted in Campbellton on September 9th, 1915. He went to Sussex where he was drafted into the 55th Battalion. After being in England a short time he

He was in the trenches a year and six months when he was wounded twice. He was then transferred to the C. T. M. B., where he died of wounds on December 10th, 1917.
