**TRANSATLANTIC TRADE.**

Shipping Companies Suffered Heavily Last Year.

LONDON, April 11.—The fall of the transatlantic shipping trade for 1926 shows an extraordinary decline, which makes the year 1926 the lowest in the history of the industry. The shipping companies report that the total tonnage of cargo shipped to America in 1926 was 5,500,000 tons, compared with 6,500,000 tons in 1925. The loss was 15 per cent.
