

to discontinue the importation of Canadian horses for the army. In a previous issue we described the classes of horses demanded for the British army, and showed that suitable animals were extremely scarce. The consignments from Canada already made have given excellent satisfaction; but the present complaint is that our horses are too dear. One cause of the high price is the expense incurred in travelling over so large a territory for so small a number of suitable horses. Our farmers should not relax their efforts in breeding the class of horses required for army purposes, for such animals are also best suited for all other purposes, except as heavy drafts, and there will always be an active demand for them whether required for the Brit ish army or rot. Even granting thet a good class of horses is bred, which s not suitable for cavalry or artillery purposes, a demand for army horses would leave a vacancy which could readily be filled from the class unsuited for the army, the consequences being that the prices of all classes of light horses would advance. Lighter horses can be raised more cheaply, and are likely to command a higher price. It is to be regretted that horse preeding is not engaged in more extensively than it is. A horse can be raised as cheaply as a steer or a cow, and who does not know the difference in price? Another advantage in horse preeding is that the army officers seldom ask for the pedigree of the horse; individual merit settles every point, Hardiness, freedom from disease, and suitable contour and action being the special requisites.
