ONTARIO AT OTTAWA.

THE MEMBERS FOR THIS PROVINCE IN THEIR PLACES. A Very Considerable Government - Licensed Tobacco Factories - Squatters and the Qu'Appelle Farming Co. Special Dispatch to The World.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—Empty seats were not so numerous in the house today, a majority of the Ontario members having returned to their districts. In accordance with the judgment of the supreme court, Mr. Brock took his seat for Queen's P. E. I., unopposed.

Return were ordered respecting licensed tobacco factories in which Canadian law is exclusively made, and respecting the appointment of the Hon. Hector Fabre as Canadian agent in France.

The sovereignty of squatters was maintained by Mr. Watson in moving for copies of an order in council setting apart the lands to be granted to the Qu'Appelle Valley farming company, and containing the conditions of such grant.

The house adjourned at 4.30 on a nod from Sir John Macdonald and the speaker. The opposition members from the maritime provinces promise to give their leader good assistance this session.

A largely signed petition came up from Nova Scotia today against the running of railway trains on the Sabbath. The government general, Hon. Mr. Sticks, and Miss West visited parliament buildings today. They were delighted with the library.

The return of Mr. Baskerville in this city was only accomplished by disgraceful and even dishonorable tactics. Bishop Duhamel commanded the reform candidates to retire from the contest, but Mr. O'Keefe refused to do so and held out to the last.

A COURT SCENE AT WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—In the star route trial to-day Informer Berardelli's cross-examination was resumed. An angry passage occurred between Merriek and Ingeroll. Merriek said he should interrupt without regard to the witness of counsel.

Merriek (turning quickly towards his opponent)—I never give my regard to a puppy. Ingeroll (voluntarily picking up a heavy inkstand and red with anger)—You are a dirty dog.

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When the court called counsel to enter after the angry colloquy, Ingeroll said no man could abuse him without resistance and he would defend himself with any little puny power.

Merriek also contended that any offensive remarks he might have made in this or at the previous trial should be stricken out of the record.

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THE FREE LIBRARY BOARD.

CHAIRMAN HAZZARD'S ADDRESS TO THE MEMBERS. How the Scheme can be Planned and Permanently Established—The Probable Cost of Buildings and Equipments.

The free public library board met at the city hall yesterday afternoon. Chairman Hazzard presented an address to the board of management in accordance with the wishes of the board.

The chairman said that a library of this kind, to be valuable as far as our own country is concerned, should contain a full collection of—

Books of all kinds, especially such as relate to Canadian history, travels and geography, and also to the history and literature of the various nations of the world.

The chairman also mentioned the need for a collection of maps, atlases, and other geographical works, and also for a collection of scientific and technical works.

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ARRESTED AS AN ASSASSIN.

THE CHARGE AGAINST FRANK BYRNE IN PARIS. Mr. Gladstone Trying to Improve English and French Relations—The Times on the Demand for Extradition.
