

TO REDUCE THE FEE.

Some of the members of the College of Pharmacy think they pay too dear for their whistle. The Council of the College of Pharmacy discussed at length yesterday Mr. N. C. Polson's proposition to reduce the annual fee from \$4 to \$2. This would mean a reduction of \$1000 per annum in the receipts of the college.

Measrs. Edgar & Malou, solicitors for the council, gave as their opinion that the creditors of the council would never allow a reduction of the receipts of the college, as the same had been pledged in security for the loan.

Mr. Polson said that there was too much extravagance in the management of the business of the college, and until the fees were reduced no reform would be effected. Besides, he held it was unfair to require the young men better opportunities than they themselves enjoyed.

Mr. C. D. Dutton, seconded by C. K. McGregor, moved that the fee be reduced to \$1. Mr. Polson thought this was going too far, as the Pharmaceutical Journal alone was worth more than that.

Mr. C. D. Dutton's resolution was finally referred to a special committee consisting of Vice-President Clark and Mr. Jordan, who will investigate the question of the receipts as a security of the loan company.

WHAT DID THE JURY MEAN?

Wants a New Trial Owing to a Judge's Clerical Error. The Common Pleas Divisional Court yesterday heard an appeal in the action of Chamberlain v. the City of Guelph. Chamberlain was injured by a fall on an alleged defective sidewalk and sued the city for damages. At the trial Mr. Justice Street found in favor of the city, but the judge directed judgment to be entered for the defendant. One of the jurymen after the trial met the counsel for the plaintiff and spoke of the judgment they had given for the plaintiff and, though it was pointed out to him that judgment was for the defendant, insisted that the matter was looked into and it was found that the judge had inserted the word defendant for plaintiff in his question as to whether contributory negligence was shown. The plaintiff wants a new trial to find out what the jury meant.

Rules for Lent in the Archdiocese. 1. All days of Lent, Sundays excepted, are fasting days. 2. By a special dispensation from the Holy See, meat is allowed on Sundays at every meal, and on one meal on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, except the Saturday of Ember Week and Holy Saturday.

The following persons are exempted from the fast, including those under 14 years of age, and from fasting, persons under 21; and from either or both, who, on account of ill health, advanced age, hard labor or some other legitimate cause, cannot observe the law.

Persons who are engaged in preparing food during the season of Lent, as also in all days of abstinence throughout the year, by those who cannot easily procure buttermilk.

The season within which all who have obtained the proper grace are obliged to make the Paschal Communion, commencing on Ash Wednesday and terminating on Trinity Sunday.
